All meetings of the city council of the City of Pekin are a deliberative and legislative assemblage and not a public forum. The purpose of these meetings is to conduct city business. The city council considers both oral and written communications in making and establishing policies.

All city residents, property owners, business members and other interested parties are invited to address the council at the designated time (public input) for a period of 5 (five) minutes. All questions shall be directed to the council as a whole and not individual members. It is strongly encouraged that all questions shall first be directed to the appropriate personnel at the City Municipal Building or other city office before bringing them to the city council.

Because all meetings of the Pekin City Council are a matter of public record, each speaker, when recognized by the Mayor or his designee, shall give their full name.

Council members may appropriately interrupt a speaker to ask questions necessary to clarify the speaker's comments. In most cases, the council will not answer questions from the public at the council meeting, but will respond to the individual in due time. All questions requiring a researched answer shall be submitted in writing and turned to the city clerk. Please provide your name and contact information so that we can get back to you in a timely manner. The Council cannot address questions involving litigation, possible litigation or employee matters.

Any charges or complaints against individual employees of the City of Pekin shall be presented to the city manager in writing with specific information, and shall be signed by the person or persons lodging the charges or complaints. Pursuant to the Illinois Privacy Act, no person shall be permitted to present orally or discuss at any open meeting, charges against any city employee.

The **Pledge of Allegiance** was led by Mayor McCabe.

Roll was called. All members were physically present. A quorum was declared.

AGENDA

Motion by Council Member Abel, seconded by Council Member Ritchason that the **agenda be approved as presented**. Council Member Golden expressed concern that the agenda was not restored exactly to the format prior to eliminating public input at the end of the Council meetings. Mayor McCabe advised the Council Member that agendas had taken on several layouts over the years. What was voted by council at the previous meeting was an ordinance to amend the Order of Business in the Code. Mayor McCabe stated that he would allow the public to comment on business items at the beginning of the meeting and at the end to present comments on any other business as intended. Council Member Golden questioned the absence on the agenda of reconvening to address new business after meeting in closed session. On roll call vote, Ayes, Orrick, Abel, Ritchason, Luft, Dunn, McCabe; Nay Golden. Motion Carried.

MINUTES

Motion by Council Member Abel, seconded by Council Member Dunn that the **minutes of the Regular City Council Meeting of August 10, 2015 be approved as written**. It was noted the typo correction of the word single for signal. On roll call vote all present voted Aye.

PUBLIC INPUT

Council heard comments, requests and questions from the following members of the public:

Jim Mangan read from a prepared statement and urged Council to vote no on ordinance to amend the Code regarding the tourism committee. He felt changing the wording of the expenditure proceeds was an insult to the public and only persons that did not understand it were those that didn't follow it.

Ann Witzig asked the following questions:

Who started the request for action to rezone three properties on Court Street. Code Enforcement Officer Ron Sieh informed the Council and public that 2 of the owners of the property made the request. He additional discussed with a third owner in order to make 3 of the properties conform to the proper use uniformly.

Bob Bramham stated he read into the RFCA that the rezoning had to do with making Court Street 2 lanes and asked that Council explain the revamping measures. Mr. Sieh also advised Mr. Bramham upon his request the difference in the zoning classifications of OS-1 and B-3. In regards to the business item for tourism, Mr. Bramham stated any money that came out of Hotel/Motel fund had to be a grant.

A response to a question posed by the Mayor on the fire report of “good intent call” and “false alarm calls” was given by Fire Chief Nelson. On roll call vote Ayes, Orrick, Abel, Ritchason, Luft, Dunn, McCabe; Nay Golden. Motion Carried.

COMMUNICATIONS, PETITIONS, REPORTS

Bill Fleming representing the members of the Economic Development Advisory Committee presented to the Council the Committee’s proposal and recommendation of an additional ½% to the City of Pekin Home Rule Sales Tax, with a ¼% allocated to fund economic development and the other ¼% allocated to fund infrastructure and improvements. He advised the Council of the costs and constraints realized after a discussion in June for a potential revenue stream of a Business District. Because the City of Pekin had been unable to fund the Pekin Economic Development Investment Fund (PEDIF) for the past 3 years and the cost of road and infrastructure maintenance and improvements continues to increase at a pace greater than the City ‘s revenues, the committee asked the Council to adopt the increase by ordinance. The intention of the proposal was to strictly limit the expenditures to economic development and infrastructure, to separate funds and accounting to ensure accountability and transparency by ordinance. He advised annualized, the new tax would generate about \$800,000 additional revenue to economic development and infrastructure and roads would likewise receive an estimated \$800,000 based on present sales tax numbers. Mr. Fleming encouraged the Council to consider the adoption of an ordinance in September in order to comply with statutes to have paperwork to the State by October1, 2015 for January 1, 2016 implementation.

NEW BUSINESS

The following rezoning ordinances were presented as recommendations of the Planning Commission and questions from the Council were addressed by Code Enforcement Officer Ron Sieh. He advised that the City, on behalf of the property owners asked to rezone the parcels in an appropriate use in a B-3 District. Leaving the zoning in an Office Service District could impede development. As an example Mr. Sieh told Council one of the owners had lost a sale due to non-conforming zoning. Also 2 of the 3 parcels, old Ponderosa and Fiesta Ranchero were considered non-conforming uses due to the approval of liquor licenses obtained for the businesses occupying the structures in the past.

Motion by Council Member Ritchason, seconded by Council Member Orrick that Ordinance No.1568-A202-15/16 be adopted. The ordinance provided for the rezoning of property from B-1 (Local Business District) to B-3 (General Business District).On roll call vote; Ayes, Orrick, Abel, Ritchason, Luft, Dunn, McCabe; Nay Golden. Motion Carried.

Motion by Council Member Dunn, seconded by Council Member Ritchason that the **RECYCLING GRANT AGREEMENT WITH TAZEWELL COUNTY in the amount of \$69,010.00 be approved.** The motion was restated for the corrected figure of \$69,010.00. The City Manager informed the Council of the City's uses of the grant monies to support and in connection with the County approved recycling collection program. In response to Council's questions Mr. Girdler stated the funds had been used to purchase recycling totes, solid waste truck, containers in connection with the grade schools collections, recycling drop-off facility, daily dumping fees. Because of the low return on paper products he felt it was not beneficial at this time for the City to implement collection from businesses. A concern of a residence on Derby Street not receiving recycling pickup would be addressed by the Solid Waste Supervisor. On roll call vote all present voted Aye.

Motion by Council Member Dunn, seconded by Council Member Abel that the **LOCAL AGENCY AGREEMENT WITH ILLINOIS DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION** for City share of traffic signal project at Illinois Route 29 at Manito Black Top in the amount of \$506.00, be approved. Council was asked to approve the IDOT agreement providing for the 10% or \$506.00 share of costs to upgrade the signal controller cabinets on IL 29. He stated that the following resolution appropriated the 125% of the total estimated construction and engineering costs estimated at \$270,250.00. On roll call vote all present voted Aye.

Motion by Council Member Golden, seconded by Council Member Orrick that Resolution No. 9-15/16 in the amount of \$635.00 be adopted. On roll call vote all present voted Aye.

ORDINANCE NO. 2724-15/16
AMENDING TITLE 2, CHAPTER 12, SECTION 5
OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF PEKIN 1995
REGARDING TOURISM, CONVENTION AND VISITORS COMMITTEE

Motion by Council Member Golden, seconded by Council Member Abel that Ordinance No. 2724-15/16 be adopted. Mayor McCabe introduced at the wishes of Council Members to amend the expenditure provisions of the tourism chapter of the Code to provide language that expenditures that exceed \$1,500.00 be presented to the Council for approval. Council Member Orrick spoke to the change and felt the consideration should be postponed until an audit of the funds was completed and possibly some addition revisions made. In further discussion it was determined that Council Member Orrick would accept a printout of all expenditures from the Hotel/Motel Tax fund and not an independent audit as requested .It was Council Member Luft opinion that there needed to be further discussion after review of the checks written from the fund. A motion was then made by Council Member Orrick and it was seconded by Council Member Abel that Ordinance No. 2724-15/16 be tabled. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS TO COME BEFORE THE COUNCIL

Kurt Morgan owner of Pekin Alignment requested that the City remove barricades placed on St. Mary Street to prevent dumping. He told the Council that the blocked streets were hindering his customers from entering and leaving his place of business. He submitted a petition from his customers for the record.

Bob Bramham spoke in support of the request to remove the barricades. He stated the City should do the job of picking up the garbage and to mow the vacant area. He spoke in opposition to the increased sales tax.

Sally Johnson addressed the Council with the following concerns and questions. She asked if Council had received the copies of previous year minutes of the Tourism Committee, street condition report, response from engineering firm for Court Street alternatives, satisfaction that weeds were taken care of on Veterans Drive, report on group homes, and status of Derby Street project for retention of water.

Mrs. Johnson spoke in opposition to the City considering alcohol sales were fuel was also sold. She felt the City should restrict alcohol sales to cash only. She stated her agreement that Jane Street needed to be top priority and that department heads needed to attend all Council meetings.

Steve Rager representing Remington Road residents submitted a petition requesting the current proposal for the installation of street lights be amended, reducing the required streets lights to one at 14th street and one on the curve for safety. The residents asked that the illumination from 19 light post be sufficient for safety and security of residents and through traffic.

Jim Mangan, in reference to concerns of misappropriation of the Tourism funds, indicated Attorney Dancey's opinion was attempt to cover-up which justified unethical, illegal, actions. He urged Council to instruct the Manager to replace the firm. Further he charged that Mayor McCabe knowingly joined in a conspiracy to hide the truth to illegal misappropriation of funds and should be censured as provided in the City Code of Conduct. Ann Witzig supported the request of Pekin Alignment to remove barricades in that area for her and her tenants to access her rental property. Mrs. Witzig read an article that supported her concern of HUD communities' obligation to affirmatively further fair housing.

Leigh Ann Brown in answer to a concern of advertizing in Tennessee reported there were not direct expenditures listed. What the visitor reported seeing with Pekin's name may have been the 2012 Today in America infomercial clip or an advertisement produced as part of Pekin's partnership with Peoria.

Darin Girdler congratulated employees Devin Brooks and Steve Lash in completing the wastewater class 1 operators testing. He also announced closings and openings scheduled for Veterans Drive project in the immediate future.

Attorney Burt Dancey advised the Council that as staff members it has become difficult to take at each meeting the unfair attacks and allegations of illegal and unethical actions from the public. Mr. Dancey would respond to Mr. Mangan's charges directly.

Fire Chief Kurt Nelson reported to Council all the facts and information requested by the Council into the history, licensing, regulations regarding group houses in the City of Pekin. The City presently has 22 group housing units that the departments are aware of regulated by the State. The City has no authority to limit the location of the homes. Special permits or zoning was not needed for less than 8 person residences.

Council Member Dunn urged the Council to begin looking a more strategic goals and bigger issues that the administration needs to work toward possibly in the setting of a retreat.

Council Member Luft suggested possibly holding 2 policy meetings a month based on Peoria's process. The Council Member questioned why the motion funding the police and fire pensions removed from the agenda had not been reconsidered for discussion.

Council Member Abel voiced concern about sink holes sitting open in several locations; the list for mowing and weed complaints had not been addressed including problem property at 1027 Mechanic.

Council Member Golden stated his concerns of the weeds at the riverfront City owned properties; clumps of grass in storm structures on Veterans Drive; was cautious of conducting a policy session when a previous Council/Staff session resulted in nothing tangible accomplished; a complaint he received that larger solid waste items were being picked up at an employee residence with out the proper \$20 paid fee. The Council Member was advised that a HUD notice of property assignment published in the newspaper was one of several notices the City receives on foreclosure properties and not an indication that HUD was buying up properties in Pekin. Mayor McCabe advised the Council that the concept of a Retreat was being considered with a facilitator that would guide the Council in frank and meaningful discussions.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Motion by Council Member Golden, seconded by Council Member Ritchason, that the Council move to Executive Session at 7:45 p.m. to discuss 65 ILCS 120/2 (c) (1.) Personnel. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

No further business to come before the Council, motion by Council Member Golden, seconded by Council Member Orrick that Council adjourn. Motion carried voice vote. Mayor McCabe adjourned the meeting in open session.

Three members of the Council set a special meeting on August 15, 2015 to discuss a check issued to Illinois High School Association (IHSA). Notice was properly posted and Council received notice of the special meeting on Monday, August 17, 2015.

The **Pledge of Allegiance** was led by Mayor John McCabe.

Roll was called and all Council Members were physically present. A quorum was declared.

Motion by Council Member Luft, seconded by Council Member Orrick that the agenda be approved as presented. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

COMMUNICATIONS, PETITIONS, REPORTS

Mayor McCabe stated that the meeting initiated by Council Member Golden was to discuss a check in the amount of \$5,000.00 that had been disbursed to the Illinois High School Association in connection with their sponsorship of March Madness Experience for Boys Basketball Tournament held in Peoria.

Discussion followed on the question of who had the authority to make the determination to pay the invoice when in previous years the approval came before the City Council. It was stated the 2014 Council minutes reflected that the Council voted and the disbursement was denied.

Further discussion followed:

- duties of the Tourism Committee
- unavailability of written meeting minutes to the Council of Committee's previous years
- benefit produced to tourism verified by audit of motel overnight stays for proper use of the tax
- language sections in the City code of the Hotel/Motel proceeds of tax to be used exclusively for the promotion of tourism and/or the sections for the function of the Pekin Tourism, Convention and Visitors Committee regarding expenditures of the tax verified by grant application provided in the Committee's budget.

Attorney Dancey gave the opinion that the request for \$5,000.00 was a contractual obligation, not a grant, to the IHSA for sponsorship of the regional event and the City purchased and received consideration in the form of advertising to the visitors for which the manager had authority from approved budget of previous administration.

Council Member Luft requested:

An audit of the Tourism Committee for 2014-2015

Agendas, minutes, notes from meetings

Statement from City Attorney clarifying if there was wrong doing

Written not from the Manager Darin Girdler that Director of Economic Development and Tourism Leigh Ann Brown did nothing wrong.

Council requested clarity in the provisions of the Code be addressed for expenditure approvals by Council over \$1,500.00 limits. It was stated that IHSA had never been required to submit grant applications. Council discussed that action take place for the inappropriate activities of the manager and staff. In conclusion a written and signed admission of misuse of authority and others involvement would put the concerns of Council to rest.

Each Council member was given the opportunity to make individual comments.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS TO COME BEFORE THE COUNCIL

Public was given the opportunity for input, questions, or concerns. The following people addressed the Council with general comments of mistrust that taxpayer money was spent appropriately; need for transparency; violations of city employees; Bob Bramham, Jim Mangan, Ed Schwin, Sally Johnson, Ann Witzig, Steve Heisel, Larry Wolfer, Steve Dennis and Brandon Dentino.

No further business to come before the Council, motion by Council Member Luft, seconded by Council Member Orrick to adjourn. Motion carried viva voce.

1. Offstreet Parking Request on S. 7th St. @ 615 Park Ave.

Frank Fink, 323 S. 4th St. (353-8639) made this request and was in attendance at the meeting. He is the owner of the property at 615 Park Avenue and intends to turn the north end of the building into his residence. He operates a karate school from the building as well and is considering eliminating the parking on the west side of the building and is interested in possibly creating offstreet angled parking on the east side of the building. This would involve eliminating the sidewalk in that location. This idea is not definite at this time. He was advised to contact the committee when he receives a response from zoning and if he decides to explore other options. Jim made a motion to table this request until Mr. Fink receives a response from zoning. Kurt seconded. All in favor.

2. Stop Sign Request on N. Capitol St. @ Amanda St. or Illinois St.

Nick Rinaldo, 1328 N. Capitol St. (309-210-1579) made this request. He is concerned with the speed of traffic in this location. It was noted that stop signs don't address speeding. It was also noted that N. Capitol St. is a thru street. The speed spy will be put out in this location and enforcement will be stepped up. Jim made a motion to review the speed spy results at next month's meeting. Kurt seconded. All in favor.

3. Stop Sign Request on Somerset St. @ Charlotte St.

Dennis received a request with a concern regarding the line of sight at the intersection of Washington St. and Court St. Darin will contact the property owner, John Neumann, regarding the bush on the NE corner of the building that is hindering the line of sight in that location.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE 3, CHAPTER 2 SECTIONS 1, 2 AND 3 OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF PEKIN 1995 REGARDING MUNICIPAL TAXATION

WHEREAS, the Code of the City of Pekin 1995 was adopted on April 10, 1995, and duly published in book form; and

WHEREAS, under Article VII, Section 6(a), of the Illinois Constitution of 1970, the City of Pekin is a home rule municipality, and desires to exercise its rights and powers as a home rule municipality in this matter; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is in the best interests of the City to amend the City Code regarding Municipal Taxation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PEKIN, ILLINOIS:

1. That Title 3, Chapter 2, Section 1A be amended by deleting the existing rate of

1 1/4%, and inserting the new rate of 1 3/4% as per the following language:

A. Tax Imposed: A tax is hereby imposed upon all persons engaged in the business of selling tangible personal property, other than an item of tangible personal property titled or registered with an agency of this State's government, at retail in this municipality at the rate of (1 3/4%) of the gross receipts from such sales made in the course of such business in accordance with the terms, conditions and limitations of Chapter 65 ILCS 5/8-11-1.

2. That Title 3, Chapter 2, Section 2A be amended by deleting the existing rate of 1 1/4%, and inserting the new rate of 1 3/4% as per the following language:

A. Tax Imposed: A tax is hereby imposed upon all persons engaged in the business of making sales of service at the rate of (1 3/4%), as imposed by Section 3-2-1A hereof, of the selling price of all tangible personal property transferred by such servicemen, either in the form of tangible personal property or in the form of real estate as an incident to a sale of service in accordance with the terms, conditions and limitations of Chapter 65 ILCS 5\8-11-5.

3. That Title 3, Chapter 2, Section 3A be amended by deleting the existing rate of 1 1/4%, and inserting the new rate of 1 3/4% as per the following language:

A. Tax Imposed: A tax is hereby imposed in accordance with provisions of Chapter 65 ILCS 5/8-11-6 upon the privilege of using in the City any item of tangible personal property which is purchased at retail from a retailer and which is titled or registered with the state at a location within the City. This tax shall be at rate of (1 3/4%) of the selling price of such tangible personal property with "selling price" to have the meaning as defined in the "Use Tax Act", approved July 14, 1955, as amended. Such tax shall be collected from retailers whose Illinois address for titling or registration purposes is given as being in the City.

4. Furthermore, the proceeds from this half (1/2) percent increase of the home rule sales tax shall be placed in a separate special revenue fund, with two (2) separate departments, within the City and its' investments. 50% of the proceeds to an allocated department and, shall be used and expended only pursuant to the Economic Development Investment Fund, for which proposals will be vetted by the Economic Development Advisory committee with recommendation submissions to City Council based on the return on investment analysis guidelines, and according to its' rules and regulations for use. The other 50% of the proceeds to an allocated department and, shall be used for infrastructure and road improvements, for work performed by third parties. All dollars issued by either department under the separate special revenue fund requires final City Council approval.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that all other parts of the Code of the City of Pekin 1995 as amended except as modified herein are hereby reaffirmed and ratified and are in full force and effect.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that all Ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and approval and publication as required by law.

DESCRIPTION: Economic Development Advisory Committee brought a potential revenue stream of a Business District to support development and infrastructure before City Council at the June joint meeting. Discussions continued with resources on Business District to realize the cost and constraints with the Business District. The EDAC presented Council on August 24 to use Home Rule instead of the Business District to eliminate cost to establish the new revenue shared tax (non-residents and residents) to Pekin's Retailer Occupation Tax throughout the City limits. Request is for approval by Mayor and Council to amend Home Rule Municipal Retailer Occupation Tax rate by ordinance to increase sales tax from 1 ¼% to 1 ¾% creating a Special Revenue Fund with two (2) separate departments with each receiving 50% of the fund revenue. The Home Rule tax does NOT apply to groceries, prescription drugs, vehicle sales or anything titled to the State. The Economic Development Investment Fund receiving 50% of the funds to increase Pekin's economy by investing in development projects that generate a return to the general fund on sales tax, property tax, jobs, construction impact, motor fuel, food and beverage and gaming tax. The other separate department receiving 50% for infrastructure and road improvements to match other funds for road projects or assist in road improvements by 3 rd party vendors.

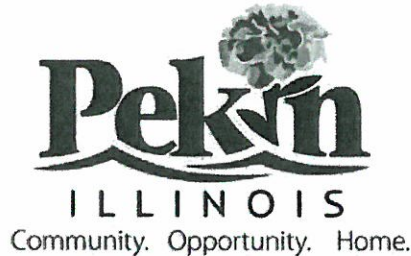

Re: Sales Tax

Given the competitive environment for development, rising cost of infrastructure and construction, 2021 expiration of Central Business District TIF, along with the fact that our Pekin Economic Development Investment Fund has not been funded for over three years, the Economic Development Advisory Committee recommends a new revenue stream. This funding source will keep Pekin competitive with surrounding communities such as Morton, and East Peoria who have had the Business District sales tax tool for 3 years. Using home rule powers, increase sales tax by $\frac{1}{2}$ cent thereby providing half of the funds for economic development investment fund and half of the funds for infrastructure and roads. The $\frac{1}{2}$ cent is estimated to bring in \$1,600,000 annually of new funds. The split funds would be directed by City Ordinance as a special revenue fund for economic development and for infrastructure improvement and third party work for road projects. Even with this suggested increase to the home rule sales tax, the City's rate would not exceed those rates in Peoria or East Peoria. As a sales tax, it would be spread across all users of our community, not just those who pay property tax.

Given that ANY form of taxation is regressive, we recognize that no tax is "popular;" rather, we seek one that is LESS regressive to a large majority of citizens. Increasing the Home Rule Sales Tax from 1.25 to 1.75 per cent seems to best accomplish that for the following reasons:

1. The Home Rule Sales Tax (HMST) does NOT apply to groceries, prescription drugs, or vehicle sales.

2. Obviously, it also doesn't affect those items upon which typical residents spend the majority of their income, i.e. house payment/rent, car payments, utilities, "services," etc. in addition to the above mentioned items.
3. Yes, restaurants/fast foods, clothing, alcohol, tobacco, and other items would be affected, but many of those fall into a category which might best be described, generally, as discretionary.
4. Pekin is a "mini trade center," which is to say that a significant portion of sales tax is generated by non residents; a guesstimate might be conservative at 20 to 25%.
5. The total sales tax of 8.5% proposed breaks down to 6.25% to the state, 1/2% to Tazewell County, and—if adopted—1.75% Pekin Home Rule. The EDAC feels that at 8.5% Pekin would still be competitive with other local communities, especially with our primary competition Peoria, which is already at 8.25% with 9.25% in sales tax districts, East Peoria at 8% and 8.50% to 9% within sales districts and Washington at 8%. After excluding all of the "non-affected" areas (on which, typically people/families spend 75% of their income), most residents are unlikely to spend more than \$10,000 per year on items taxed at 8%; that means a total increase of \$50 annually. As an example, a \$16 order at one's favorite fast food establishment would increase by 8 cents.

Reasons for separation of the Fund:

- 1) Annualized, the new tax would generate about \$ 800,000 additional revenue for economic development that will support projects that will provide a return on investment from new or increased property tax, sales tax, and economic impact of new jobs and construction jobs to name a few positive impacts. This money is used to expand the Pekin Economy and the return on investment all flows into the general fund revenues assisting the now tight budget. Another necessary reason for the separation of the fund is that each developer agreement that is signed will require an ongoing, (multiple-year) funding source that must be relied on. We discussed in our briefing sessions with Council the Big R and Bergner's projects. The Big R incentive was provided by the PEDIF fund and the Bergner's renovation was a separate developer agreement. In both cases the City gave an incentive for a new business coming to town or renovating an existing business to help it stay current and viable. In both cases the City investment is being paid back with new sales tax revenues, or a loan is being repaid where the city earns an interest spread. In both cases above and beyond the return both parties exceeded increased sales and the City has enjoyed a larger than budgeted revenue benefit. The Economic Development Advisory Committee will vet the projects utilizing the "Developer's Proposal" and provide recommendation to City Council for approval.
- 2) The infrastructure and road improvement portion of the fund will likewise receive \$800,000 annually. The road projects will need to be performed by a third party but could be used for materials on a job that is being performed by City workers. This fund will improve roads/ sidewalks, Court and Front Street improvements and other infrastructure needs. This fund fulfills a need for improvement but does not have the same economic return that was discussed earlier. That is not to say that a large road improvement project that satisfies the criteria of both funds could use allocated moneys from both funds. This would fall under budgeted items and of course, money obligated for prior economic development agreements would not be available to go toward road projects.

But since infrastructure many times is a function of economic development and developer agreements, and since good roads and the appearance of the city could be an integral part of economic development, we can envision some specific projects both economic development/ or infrastructure being funded from both funds.

- 3) Fund accounting would track all revenues (payments from development loans) and expenses for the economic development investment fund and infrastructure and road improvement fund. Each year the budget would detail the committed funds, dollars available to each fund program and dollars for proposals in the Economic Development Investment Fund.

WHEREAS, the City of Pekin's Economic Development Advisory Committee (EDAC) has proposed an additional ½% to the City of Pekin Home Rule Sales Tax, with ¼% allocated to fund economic development and the other ¼% allocated to fund infrastructure maintenance and improvements; and

WHEREAS, the intention of the EDAC proposal is to strictly limit the expenditure of these funds, by ordinance, to their intended purpose of Economic Development programs and projects, and infrastructure maintenance and improvements; and

WHEREAS, the EDAC proposal requires this new revenue be directed by ordinance to separate funds and accounts to ensure accountability and transparency.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Pekin Area Chamber of Commerce, does hereby support an increase of ½% in the City's Home Rule Sales Tax. This support is contingent upon the City Council's commitment, by ordinance, to restrict the use of these funds exclusively for the purposes outlined above, and in the ratios outlined above. Additionally, this support is contingent upon the City Council's commitment, by ordinance, to accountability and transparency by depositing these sales tax revenues into separate funds and accounts that are separate from the City's General Fund.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that William T. Fleming, Executive Director, is authorized on behalf of the Board of Directors, to communicate this support to the Pekin City Council, chamber members, and the public.

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE 8, CHAPTER 4, SECTION 3 F.

REGARDING HANDICAPPED SPACES**

WHEREAS, the Code of the City of Pekin 1995 was adopted on April 10, 1995, and duly published in book form;

WHEREAS, the City of Pekin is a home rule municipality as described in Section 6(a), Article VII of the 1970 Constitution of the State of Illinois, and as such may exercise any power and function pertaining to its government and its affairs; and

WHEREAS, the Traffic Safety Committee reviewed the request of a handicapped resident and proper form signed by the resident's doctor for placement of a handicapped parking space on Vienna Court 10' West of Walkway between 1825 and 1827 Vienna Court at the meeting of September 4; 2015 and

WHEREAS, the Traffic Safety Committee recommends to Council to consider designating on-street handicapped space on Vienna Court at 10' west of walkway between 1825 and 1827 Vienna Court; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of the safety and welfare of the residents of the City of Pekin, Tazewell County, Illinois to adjust the Code to reflect the current handicapped space signs that are in place in town; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PEKIN, ILLINOIS:

1. That Title 8, Chapter 4, Section 3. F. be amended by adding the following designated Handicapped Spaces:

- D. Violation of Handicapped Parking: No vehicle shall be parked in a space designated for vehicles for handicapped persons unless such vehicle shall have displayed thereon a handicapped person parking device as set forth in 8-4-3-A.
- E. Regulation of Handicapped Parking Areas: The City may regulate Handicapped Parking Areas on private property if such area is properly designated with a sign in the form and manner prescribed in 625 ILCS 5/11-301. This authority is granted regardless of whether the City has entered into a contract with the property owner.
