Communications, Petitions, Reports

FINANCE REPORT PRELIMINARY FISCAL YEAR 2006 AND JUNE REPORT

City Manager Dennis Kief presented a Finance Report in the absence of City Treasurer Charles Renner. The Manager indicated Council was provided figures and observations of the City Treasurer regarding the first two months (16.67%) of the fiscal 2007 City Budget. Preliminary Fiscal Year 2006 Expenditures and Income Report was pre-audited numbers.

Mr. Kief recapped the FY 2006 figures and reported expenditures were below budgeted funds while actual revenues exceeded what was budgeted. The figures were good news but the year was light for major capital improvements.

Council was given a memo of the Manager's comments on FY 2007. Revenue sources were in line with the exception of the Telecommunications Tax. Those declining revenues and reduced income from wastewater service fee, a result of "Winter Averaging," would be closely monitored.

The following 4 expenditures would be watched closely:

- Personnel
- Gasoline
- Electricity prices
- Insurance premiums

The Manager briefly recapped line items in the red and gave reasons why. He noted the City had taken proactive steps towards GASB compliance including more formalized reconciliation protocols. He read from the prepared memo to Council his comments regarding discrepancy of approximately \$550,000 during reconciliation of the City's bank statements. Council was also informed that the City received a number of good applications for the Finance Director position. In conclusion, Mr. Kief reported the City's financial situation was good in FY 2006 and should be relatively good in FY 2007.

Commissioner Blanchard requested that the Manager explain the telecommunications decline. Referring to the increase in investments he felt it was a wise move in hiring the Treasurer. Commissioner Jones remarked that personnel increases in the 2007 budget were dictated by union contracts, but questioned if the Manager intended to increase non-union employee payroll by a merit raise system. He suggested the Manager request that the Treasurer prepare a bond report listings amounts outstanding and term remaining.

New Business

ORDINANCE NO. 2485-06/07

PROVIDING FOR THE ANNEXATION OF CERTAIN TERRITORY TO THE CITY OF PEKIN Orr Family Trust 160 Acres

Motion by Com'r. Dagit, seconded by Com'r. Jones, that Ordinance No. 2485-06/07 be adopted. Council was briefed that authorization to purchase the property was approved at the previous meeting and would close in September. The owner Robert Orr, voluntarily petitioned to annex the property directly south of the Riverway Business park 2nd Addition west of 5th Street. The property would expand the business park and allow for extending Hanna Drive. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

ORDINANCE NO. 1568 - A164-06/07

PROVIDING FOR THE ASSIGNMENT OF A ZONING CLASSIFICATION TO CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY RIVERWAY BUSINESS PARK 3RD ADDITION PARK TO PUD

Motion by Com'r. Dagit, seconded by Com'r. Jones, that Ordinance No. 1568-A164-06/07 providing for the assignment of a zoning classification of Planned Unit Development to annexed property, be adopted. The zoning was recommended by the Pekin Planning Commission pending annexation of the parcels. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

ORDINANCE NO. 1568 - A165-06/07
PROVIDING FOR THE REZONING OF CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY
RIVERWAY BUSINESS PARK 2ND ADDITION PUD

Motion by Com'r. Dagit, seconded by Com'r. Jones, that Ordinance No. 1568-A165-06/07 providing for the rezoning of property in Riverway Business Park from Agricultural to Planned Unit Development, be adopted. Com'r. Jones noted the PUD zoning classification was unique to the business park since typically other business parks are zoned industrial. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

Motion by Com'r. Blanchard, seconded by Com'r. Maddox, that the **SPECIAL USE REQUEST FOR OUTDOOR SALES/STORAGE FROM TRACTOR SUPPLY COMPANY LOCATED AT EAST COURT VILLAGE**, be approved. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

Motion by Com'r. Blanchard, seconded by Com'r. Maddox, that the **SITE PLAN FOR OUTDOOR SALES/STORAGE FROM TRACTOR SUPPLY COMPANY LOCATED AT EAST COURT VILLAGE**, be approved. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

ORDINANCE NO. 1462 – A255-06/07
AMENDING TITLE 8, CHAPTER 4, SECTION 1 D
OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF PEKIN 1995
REGARDING NO PARKING SCHEDULE

Motion by Com'r. Blanchard, seconded by Com'r. Blanchard, that Ordinance No. 1462-A255-06/07. On recommendation of the Traffic Safety Committee, Council was presented an ordinance to amend the traffic code restricting parking an additional parking stall length on South 4th Street at Court Street and to increase the length of restricted parking 82' back from the southwest corner on Washington west of Capitol Street. Both were efforts to correct visibility concerns. Com'r. Blanchard spoke in support of the TSC's recommendation to restrict parking on Washington. He had received calls and guided the concerned citizens to the committee for resolution. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

Motion by Com'r. Maddox, seconded by Com'r. Blanchard, that the **AGREEMENT WITH TAZEWELL COUNTY FOR VEHICLE MAINTENANCE**, be approved. The agreement provided for the renewal of the Intergovernmental Agreement to maintain approximately 70 vehicles for the Sheriff's Department, Probation, Health and Animal Control. Services were contracted at \$50.00 per hour and parts at cost plus 25%. Com'r. Maddox recognized the contract as an excellent example of intergovernmental cooperation. Com'r. Blanchard questioned if the terms would cover expenses and was informed by the Manager that that the terms were the same as last year but would be evaluated yearly. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

Motion by Com'r. Maddox, seconded by Com'r. Blanchard, that the **AGREEMENT WITH TAZEWELL COUNTY HEADSTART FOR VEHICLE MAINTENANCE**, be approved. The intergovernmental cooperation agreement for maintaining approximately 5 buses for the County Program provided for \$50.00 per hour terms with parts billed at cost plus 25%. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

Motion by Com'r. Dagit, seconded by Com'r. Blanchard, that the **CITY MANAGER BE AUTHORIZED TO NEGOTIATE A DRAFT FRANCHISE AGREEMENT WITH ILLINOIS-AMERICAN WATER COMPANY FOR FUTURE CONSIDERATION OF CITY COUNCIL**. Council discussed with the City Manager Dennis Kief the concept of a franchise. It was suggested the City keep options open for a buyout through the agreement.

Commissioner Dagit spoke in support of exploration of the option of a franchise. He clarified his position regarding a franchise with IAWC that had been written in the Pekin Daily Times. He felt since the Conceptual Plan indicated the Council had a low priority in going forward with the purchase of the water company, negotiating a franchise agreement could be a win win for the City and IAWC.

Commissioner Blanchard expressed support for entering into an agreement. He indicated it should have been completed long ago.

Commissioner Maddox noted negotiations would be beneficial for Council to consider options, but questioned if RWE would negotiate in “good faith”.

Commissioner Jones noted the City had tried since 1994 to negotiate an agreement but IAWC has refused. He questioned the company’s interest at this point. He hoped that Council and citizens have read the Raftilis Report. Com’r. Jones indicated it would be necessary to retain attorneys specializing in utility agreements. He suggested the Manager explore a franchise, but allow the next Council to decide if that is the best decision for citizens.

Mayor Mackaman agreed for the Manager to negotiate the concept of a franchise for Council consideration. Manager Kief to present a draft at the 2nd meeting in August.

On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS TO COME BEFORE THE COUNCIL

Com’r. Jones expressed concern of talk of building another fire station. He suggested a map be made indicating the density areas of calls and that the long range plans be based on facts. He also acknowledged the 36th Robert Monge Best Ball Golf Tournament.

Com’r. Maddox informed Council that during a hard rain on Friday the City was able to monitor the flooding of Parkway at Knollwood swale in order to justify rerouting the water to the Willow Street ditch. Public Works Director Joe Wuellner told Council the plans would now be put out for bid and would be a two-year project.

Com’r. Blanchard requested everyone’s prayers for Janson Kedzior’s safe return from Iraq. Com’r. Blanchard also acknowledged the double benefit of the Street Maintenance Project. Although residents complain about the oil and rock, citizens are provided improved streets and the sweepings are recycled for use.

Announcement was made that East Court Village Shopping Center has plans to open an apparel retailer, Steve & Barry’s in the old Penny Building in addition to the Tractor Supply Company.

Ralph Warner 2201 Parkway Drive addressed Council with his concerns of truck traffic on the extension of Velde Drive. He was told the street was intended for increase of passenger and residential traffic east to west and was not designed to relieve truck traffic on Court

Reporters from the *Peoria Journal Star* and *Pekin Daily Time* were given the opportunity to ask questions.

No further business to come before the Council, Mayor Mackaman called the meeting closed.

I hereby submit to you the Pekin Fire Department June 2006 report.

During the month of June 2006, the Pekin Fire Department responded to 288 calls total dollar loss was \$29,000.

Of this total, 288 (approximately 76.04%) were emergency medical calls, 69 were automatic fire alarms, service calls, small hazardous conditions involving no fire, false alarms and 3 involved fires which required extinguishment and/or investigation by fire fighting personnel. Total dollar loss is estimated at approximately \$29,000.00 for the month.

On June 22, 2006, Fire Fighters responded to a report of a structure fire at 1411 Black Street. Upon arrival residence was outside of home and fire could be seen coming from behind closed laundry room door. The fire was caused by a gas line that came apart at the water heater valve. We extinguished with very little water, and had to turn off the gas to residence. Called City Building Inspector and had him look over the connections to see if code has been met. His determination was that lines needed to be black iron supply and not copper. Residence will replace and have Cilco turn gas back on when completed. Approximately \$6,000.00 damage.

On June 27, 2006, Fire Fighters responded to a report of a car fire at 1006 Truman Street. Upon arrival found small fire in the rear of a mini van. It appeared fire started in the right rear tail light. The fire was mostly contained in this area. There was some smoke damage to interior of the vehicle and some melted plastic on the rear hatchback door. The fire was put out by a neighbor with a garden hose. Approximately \$1,000.00 damage.

On June 28, 2006, Fire Fighters responded to a report of a structure fire at 1712 East Shore

Drive. Upon arrival we found the ruff sawn wood siding that covered the outside of the fire place chimney on fire. The fire had already spread into the attic space next to the chimney. We used pre connect hose lines to extinguish the fire and preformed ventilation to the roof in the area of the fire. The cause was not yet determined at this time. Cilco and the City inspector were notified. Approximately \$22,000.00 damage.

Total calls for the month of June 2006 were 288 and are as follows:

Total dollar loss for the month of June 2006 was approximately \$29,000.00.

Training Division

Training report for the month of May 2006

The department's annual spring cleaning of vehicles and fire stations is done during April and May, so much of the fire fighter's time is spent doing just that. With the addition of newly hired fire fighters, much of the training time was spent teaching the new hires the basics of fire fighting. Also, the first officers meeting was held on each shift. The Chief, Deputy Chief, Asst. Chiefs and line captains attended the meetings to discuss our goals. The total number of documented training hours for May is 135.

May 2006 Fire Prevention Report

The month of May was a busy month. My first month in the new job and first I would like to make a note Chief Lauss has been very helpful in sharing his knowledge and expertise in fire inspections. On April 22, 2006 a fire at the 1430 N 8th St Pekin was determined suspicious. The 6 unit 3 story apartment fire was later determined to be arson. The Office of the State Fire Marshal Division of Arson Investigation was called to assist our department. The next few days we assisted the Pekin Police Department with polygraphs and interviews we had 13 occupants and performed 3 polygraphs at the Illinois State Police crime lab in Morton, IL.

We performed 2 large public education events. First at the Community Family Fun night at the old Wilson School. And second at the Pekin Housing authority Safety Night total students 250.

We inspected several businesses and worked with the engineer for the new WinPak Building in the Riverway Business Park.

Inspected 50 fire hydrants and followed up the Illinois American Water Company. Reviewed the

new Fire Lane No parking sign ordinance with City Clerk Sue McMillan and followed up with business owners on the new change and needed sign posting. Also issued 2 no parking in fire lane tickets. Set up public education program with WHOI TV and the Pekin Times for the need for egress windows in basements following the rescue of the trapped occupants at the Lawndale street fire.

Taught CPR at the City Hall Building for Taz Com and City Hall employees 18 students.

Performed Bike Safety Demonstration at the CB Smith school for 350 children educated them on the need for bike helmets this summer.

Assisted the children at the Schramm Education Facility in going to summer camp at the Soldwedel's Camp.

Worked with the American Red Cross for the upcoming Badges for Life blood drive campaign the event is to be held June 26, 2006 at the Miller Center 1:00pm til 6:00pm.

Worked with the Kiwanis group in the Pekin Fire Department taking over the much needed bike rodeo. The Pekin Park has allowed us to host the event at the Arena Parking lot . I visited all K thru 3rd grade schools in the city and passed out literature and sign up sheets for the bike rodeo. The Kiwanis group then donated \$120.00 toward the rodeo along with Wal Mart \$50.00. No fee will be charged to the children the event is free and to be held June 3, 2006 0800-1200.

Performed business inspection on the old Elks building, which is now owned by the First Assembly of God Church of Pekin. The building has several deficiencies and several code violations are noted. The building occupants haven't updated the building and are in violation at this point the Inspections Department has been notified and a follow-up inspection is planned.

4 service calls for open burning sites were visited and approved following EPA and City of Pekin rules and regulations the open burns were located at the Hickory Hills and Lake White Hurst subdivisions.

Followed up with the owner and occupants of the 2028 and 2032 Westage St apartment buildings needing hard-wired smoke detectors the owners were notified. Total apartment units 33.

June 2006 Fire Prevention Report

The month of June was a busy month. The Pekin Fire Department hosted its first Bike Safety Rodeo in the Pekin Park June 3, 2006.

We had 50 children and 100 adults attend the safety event. Several business inspections were

performed by the 3 stations and several follow up inspections were performed by this office. The city blood pressure screenings for the employees were again held at the city hall and Pekin service center. On June 7th I attended a computer class for the Word Perfect program this is very helpful in the inspections record keeping. Organized safety events for the Golden Arms high rise June 15 also for the Court Place high rise for June 26. Attended the Juvenile Firesetters Intervention Specialist Course at Lisle Woodridge Fire Department June 21, 22, 23. The Pekin Fire Department again held the Red Cross Blood drive at the Pekin Miller Center, we gathered 20 units of blood. Worked with the Office of the State Fire Marshals Office on the Illinois Risk Watch child safety program we are about to be approved for the free safety program to be implemented into the primary schools. Attended the Boy Scouts of America Day camp and gave fire safety class to 210 boy scouts. June 28, 2006 did follow up investigation on a house fire at 712 East Shore Dr. Pekin, IL.

Meet with the Pekin Housing authority on a complaint of a large brush pile on the housings land. They are planning to take care of this.

CITY OF PEKIN TRAFFIC SAFETY COMMITTEE MINUTES

AUGUST 4, 2006

8:30 A.M.

CITY HALL COUNCIL CHAMBERS

PRESENT: Tim Gillespie, Joe Wuellner, Dave Pagliaro, Denny Kief and Joe Berardi. Also present was Sue McMillan.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Chief Tim Gillespie.

3. Stop Sign Request at Dane-Kelsey / Susan Hope Intersection

4. Stop Sign Request at Kennedy / Susan Hope Intersection

Dean and Angie Reis were in attendance to express their concerns for children's safety in Lake Whitehurst. They said the streets were like a test track for speed (Kennedy – Susan Hope – Velde). They requested stop signs be placed on Susan Hope at Dane-Kelsey and Alexandria.

DECISION: Speed was an enforcement issue.

ACTION:

- Denied stop signs on through streets
- Denied "Children at Play" signs (no longer permitted)
- Patrol on regular basis / continue radar trailer
- Post speed limit signs of 30 mph.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Discussion School Bus Parking / Park Buses on School Property

Matt Green, Principal of Wilson Intermediate School was introduced by Matt Wilkinson. Discussion continued from previous meetings between school district and City of Pekin representatives to review options for reduced level of cars on Koch Street while retaining safety during arrival /dismissal of students. The school felt they could not handle supervision of students if the arrangement to switch bus pickup to the front of the building were implemented. Opportunities for improvement were offered:

- Advertise to parents they are not to arrive before 2:35 p.m. and encourage side street parking
- Restrict "valet parking" and require vehicles to proceed to end of loop (indicated on map)
- Place staff members out on Koch for enforcement
- Add east-bound lane on shoulder for through traffic on Koch Street (No left turn sign out of loop is posted).

DECISION: City not willing to incur expense of relocating utility poles or constructing turn lane. The committee was not in favor of the existing plan but would try and monitor.

ACTION:

- Change Snow Route signs to No Parking on Koch Street.
- Position police officer after August 24 for enforcement for the first week then monitor
- Schools to be notified to start planning over 5 year to use Life Safety Funds to accommodate buses and vehicles for arrival and dismissal on school property

1. No Parking on 14th Street Blocking Sidewalks

2. No Parking in the 1200 Block of Sheridan Blocking Sidewalks

DECISION: Enforcement issue. Chief to advise patrol units to target violations of improper parking because of complaints.

ACTION: Information regarding provisions of Code violation is to be placed on Channel 22 to educate the public.

NEW BUSINESS:

1. Request for Sign Visually Impaired Child – Slow Down (Lia Daniels) 410 Capri

DECISION: Committee discussed precedence of making signs written for individually handicapped needs.

ACTION: Letter to be sent to Lia Daniels offering to place a sign that reads “Blind Child” if proper forms are completed in order for the Street Department to monitor each year if the physically impaired person is still a resident of the street.

Next meeting will be September 13, 2006 at 3pm.



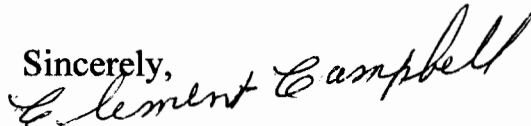

AN ORDINANCE TO ADOPT FIVE-YEAR DIGITAL SERVICE AGREEMENTS BETWEEN GALLATIN RIVER COMMUNICATIONS AND THE CITY OF PEKIN FIRE STATION 1 (EAST SIDE); CITY OF PEKIN FIRE STATION 2 (NORTH SIDE); CITY OF PEKIN FIRE STATION 3 (SOUTH SIDE); CITY OF PEKIN CITY HALL AND CITY OF PEKIN PUBLIC PROPERTIES

WHEREAS, the Code of the City of Pekin 1995 was adopted on April 10, 1995, and duly published in book form; and

WHEREAS, under Article VII, Section 6(a), of the Illinois Constitution of 1970, the City of Pekin is a home rule municipality, and desires to exercise its rights and powers as a home rule municipality in this matter; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is in the best interest of the City to facilitate and improve digital services within the following departments of the City of Pekin by the adoption of Five-Year Agreements between Gallatin River Communication and the City Of Pekin Fire Station 1 (East Side); City Of Pekin Fire Station 2 (North Side); City Of Pekin Fire Station 3 (South Side); City of Pekin City Hall and City of Pekin Public Properties, described in Exhibits “A” “B” “C” “D” and “E” attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference thereto; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is in the best interest of the City to ensure that, during the term of the abovementioned Five-Year Digital Service Agreements, if broadband services are needed at any new fire station, Gallatin River Communications will provide the installation and set up of said broadband services at no cost to the City.

Upon expiration of the initial term, the Agreement shall continue indefinitely at Gallatin River Communications' tariffed rates then in effect, subject to termination by either party upon 90 days' written notice of termination to the other party.
3. **Rates and Charges:** Customer must pay Gallatin River Communications all of the recurring charges and nonrecurring charges set forth on Schedule A. ORDINANCE NO. 2487

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE 5, CHAPTER 1A, SECTION 3-3 F. 1. OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF PEKIN 1995 REGARDING PRICE FOR PURCHASE OF LITTER CONTAINERS.

WHEREAS, the City of Pekin is a home rule municipality as described in Section 6(a), Article VII of the 1970 Constitution of the State of Illinois, and as such may exercise any power and function pertaining to its government and its affairs; and

WHEREAS, the Code of the City of Pekin 1995, adopted on April 10, 1995, and duly published in book form contains within Title 5, Chapter 1A certain cost for a compatible litter container purchased from the City of Pekin; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is in the best interest of the City to amend the fee of the 95 gallon container to cover the increased cost.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE
CITY OF PEKIN, ILLINOIS:**

1. That Title 5, Chapter 1A, Section 3-3 F. 1., PRICES FOR PURCHASE AND RENTAL OF LITTER CONTAINERS amended as follows:

F. Prices for the Purchase and Rental of Litter Containers:

1. The City shall offer for purchase by the citizens of Pekin litter containers compatible with the City's waste collection vehicles for the following prices:

95 gallon container: \$50.00

35 gallon container: \$35.00

Such prices shall include assembly of the litter containers and delivery of the same to the citizen's residence.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that all other parts of the Code of the City of Pekin 1995 as amended except as modified herein are hereby reaffirmed and ratified and are in full force and effect.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that this Ordinance takes precedence over and supercedes any and all Ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and approval and publication as required by law.

5-1A-3-3: LITTER CONTAINERS:

- A. Number and Capacity of Litter Containers: Every dwelling and building, residential or otherwise, must have litter containers of sufficient number and capacity to accommodate and contain all litter generated and accumulated by occupants of the dwelling or business building.
- B. Responsibility for Maintenance of Litter Containers:
1. The occupant or occupants of any single-family dwelling unit must supply and maintain, at all times, a ratproof and watertight container for all litter, except rubbish. Rubbish, if not stored in a ratproof and watertight container, must be stored separately in plastic bags, except those items too large to be stored therein.
 2. In multi-family dwellings of less than five (5) such units, the owner must supply and maintain, at all times, a ratproof and watertight container for all litter, except rubbish. Rubbish, if not stored in a ratproof and watertight container, must be stored separately in plastic bags, except those items too large to be stored therein.
 3. In multi-family dwellings consisting of five (5) or more individual dwellings units and in nonresidential buildings, the owner must provide a dumpster for all litter that is ratproof and watertight. However, if this requirement cannot be met because the nature or size of the property does not permit the placement or removal of a dumpster, the owner may petition the Code Enforcement Officer or his designee for an exception; provided, that such exception can be granted without substantial detriment to the public good and without impairing the general purpose and intent of this Article.
- C. Use of Litter Containers:
1. It shall be the responsibility of every occupant of a single-family dwelling to keep containers, whether they be garbage cans, dumpsters or other containers, tightly covered or sealed, except when momentarily opened to receive or remove litter.
 2. In multi-family dwellings and commercial establishments, the owner or his agent must keep containers, whether they be garbage cans, dumpsters or other containers, tightly covered or sealed at all times, except when momentarily opened to receive or remove litter.

D. Type and Placement of Litter Containers:

1. This subsection applies solely to single family dwellings and multi-family dwellings of less than five (5) units.
2. All litter containers must be stored
 - (a) inside an enclosed structure; or
 - (b) in the rear yard; or
 - (c) in the side yard.
3. Beginning September 1, 2006, all litter containers placed for pick up must be compatible with the City's waste collection vehicles and their lifter systems, and must meet the specification promulgated by the Director of Public Property from time to time.
4. When placed for pick-up, litter containers must be placed at or near the alley lot line (if permitted by the City) or curb line where the pick-up occurs. Litter containers placed at the curb line for pickup may be so placed for a period not to exceed twenty-four (24) hours. (Ord. No. 2381 07/26/04)

E. Disturbing Containers: It shall be unlawful for any person, other than the owner, occupant, tenant or members of their families, or a any container for garbage, rubbish, refuse, ashes or wastes, or to remove, displace, injure, deface, destroy, uncover or in any scavenger employed or licensed by the City, or the owner's agent, employees or servants to deposit any article, substance or thing in manner disturb such container or any litter that is placed on curb line or alley lot line for collection.

F. Prices for the Purchase and Rental of Litter Containers:

1. The City shall offer for purchase by the citizens of Pekin litter containers compatible with the City's waste collection vehicles for the following prices:

95 gallon container: ~~\$45.00~~ **\$50.00**

35 gallon container: \$35.00

Such prices shall include assembly of the litter containers and delivery of the same to the citizen's residence.

2. The City shall offer for rent litter containers compatible with its waste collection vehicles at the following rates:

- A. If the order for such container is received on or before August 30, 2005, then the cost shall be \$1.00 per month per container. This rate shall remain in effect for such rental from the date of such order until the earlier of
 - (i) the date such rental terminates, or
 - (ii) September 1, 2010.
- B. If the order for such container is received between September 1, 2005 and August 30, 2006, inclusive, then the cost shall be \$1.25 per month per container. This rate shall remain in effect for such rental from the date of such order until the earlier of
 - (i) the date such rental terminates or
 - (ii) September 1, 2010.
- C. If the order for such container is received on September 1, 2006 through September 1, 2010, then the cost shall be \$1.50 per month per container. This rate shall remain in effect for such rental from the date of such order until the earlier of
 - (i) the date such rental terminates or
 - (ii) September 1, 2010.

Such rates shall include assembly of the litter containers and delivery of the same to the citizen's residence.

E. Violation and Penalty:

- 1. It shall be unlawful for any owner or person in control of any property to allow or permit the accumulation or placement of litter on any private premises or vacant lot. The owner or person in control of any private premises or vacant property shall at all times maintain the private premises or vacant property free of litter; provided, however, that this Section shall not prohibit the storage of litter in authorized private receptacles for collection.

2. Anyone convicted of a violation of this Section 5-1A-3 shall, in addition to the costs hereinabove set forth in this Section be punished by a fine of not less than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) and not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each offense. Each day that there is a violation shall constitute a separate offense. (Ord. No. 2323 2/24/03)

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE 8, CHAPTER 2, SECTIONS 9
OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF PEKIN 1995
REGARDING AUTHORIZED STOP SIGNS**

WHEREAS, the Code of the City of Pekin 1995 was adopted on April 10, 1995, and duly published in book form;

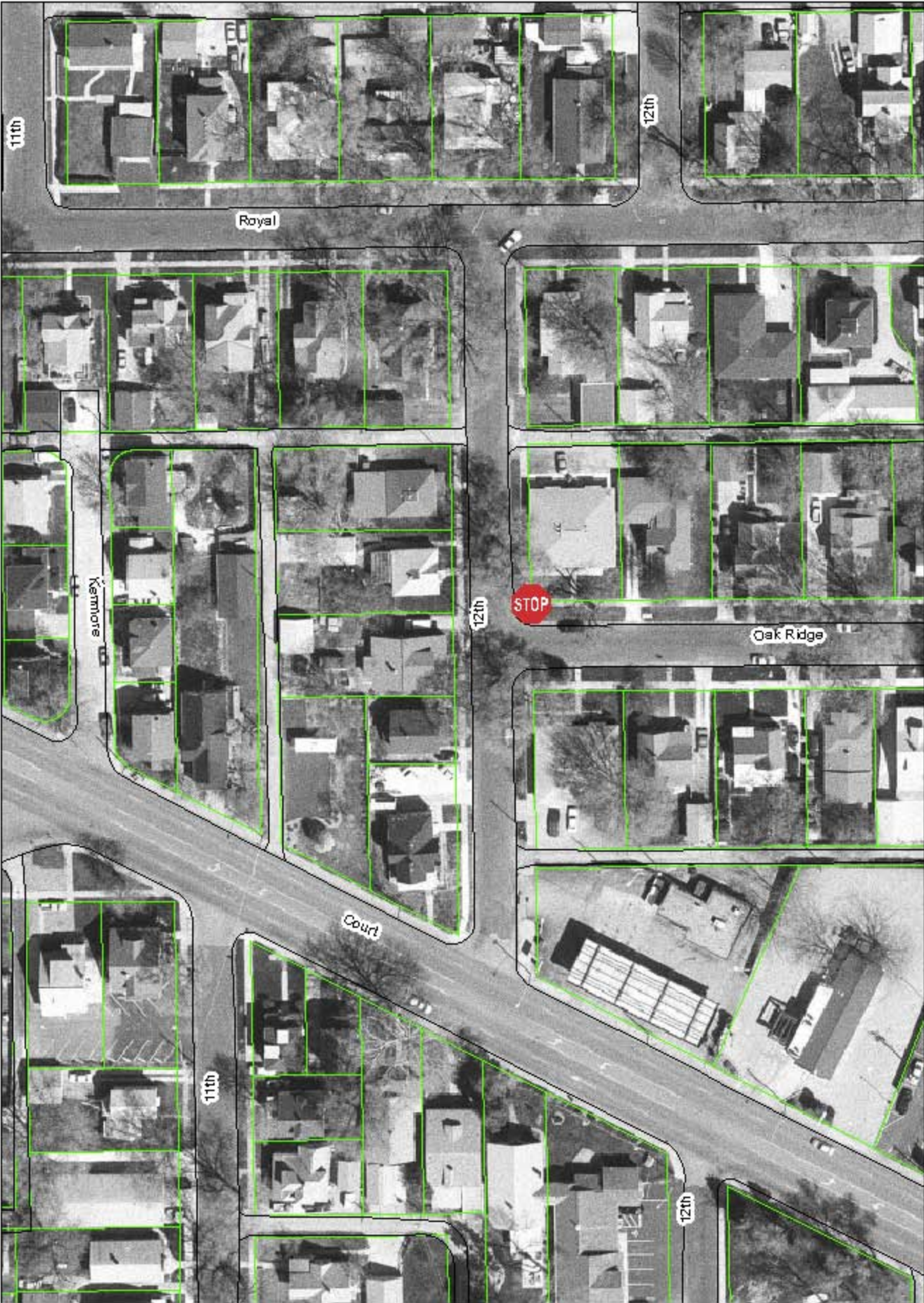
