NEW BUSINESS

**RESOLUTION NO. 68 -12/13
ADOPTING THE FISCAL YEAR
MAY 1, 2013 THROUGH APRIL 30, 2014 BUDGET
FOR THE CITY OF PEKIN**

Motion by Council Member Massaglia, seconded by Council Member Abel, that Resolution No. 68-12/13 be adopted. City Manager Joseph Wuellner presented a \$41 million second budget proposal for Council's consideration that addressed the code enforcement department back as full-time employees. The original budget proposed replacing complaint driven code enforcement with a police department community service officer while reducing the inspectors to part-time. The present Hearing Officer hours would be expanded to cover property maintenance violations. Each Council Member spoke in regards to the presented budget. It was suggested that wage freezes be encouraged during negotiation of future union contracts.

The manager stated that storm water and solid waste collection remained unfunded directly and a revenue source such as a garbage fee and utility fee were needed. On roll call vote, Ayes, Abel, Massaglia, Schmidgall, McCabe, Barra; Nay, Hendricks; Absent Blanchard. Motion Carried.

Motion by Council Member Abel, seconded by Council Member Massaglia that the **AGREEMENT WITH LHF COMPOST, INC.** for the disposal of the yard waste collected in the City of Pekin for a 3 year term with 2 option years, be approved. City Engineer Michael Guerra advised that Council asked at the April 8, 2013 meeting, that the 5 year agreement presented be reduced to a two year term. After negotiating with LHF, the minimum term considered was for three years and they would allow for two extensions of one year each. The term would be beneficial for the City as it would allow time for evaluation of any potential site, acquire a permit, and construct a facility if so desired. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

ORDINANCE NO. 2679 -12/13
APPROVING THE TRANSFER OF VOLUME CAP COLLECTION
WITH PRIVATE ACTIVITY BOND ISSUES AND RELATED MATTERS

Motion by Council Member Schmidgall, seconded by Council Member Massaglia, that Ordinance No. 2679-12/13 be adopted. The ordinance authorizing an agreement to issue Mortgage Credit Certificates to provide the Assist Program from this bond issue was adopted March 12, 2012. Pamela Anderson, Community Development Director answered Council's questions regarding the first time homebuyers program provided for from the transferred allocation applied toward the issuance of single family mortgage revenue bonds or mortgage credit certificates. The program was managed through Stern Brothers. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS TO COME BEFORE THE COUNCIL

Council received an update from City Manager Joseph Wuellner regarding the flood stage levels and rising water of the Illinois River. They were advised that employees worked the weekend sandbagging but the Sewer Treatment Plant was overcome by flood waters. The main plant continued to function treating the sewage. Also a section on the northwest side of the City was given notice to voluntarily evacuate due to impending flooding conditions. American Red Cross and Salvation Army had shelters set up.

Council Member McCabe expressed appreciation to voters for electing him to a 4 year term as Council Member.

Council Member Schmidgall encouraged the public to join him in donating blood. The Pekin Police and Fire Departments along with the Tazewell County Sheriff's Department were holding the annual Red Cross Battle of the Badges Blood Drive on Wednesday, April 24, 2013 in the Pekin City Council Chambers. He asked that his request for the City Attorney to draft a Council Member Attendance Policy move forward after his term in office. He expressed appreciation for being able to serve the public for the previous four years.

Mayor Barra stated her appreciation for the efforts of the Manager, Assistant Manager, City Engineer, Street and Sewer Treatment Plant employees, the Federal Correctional Institution, Cullinan and Son, Inc, and River City contractors in helping during the rains in keeping the Sewer Treatment Plant operational.

Brandon Dentino, 2675 Allentown Road, asked for direction in volunteering to assist in the flooding efforts and other City related activities.

Phillis Myers, 2500 Court Street, addressed the Council regarding the proper protocol and attention needed in displaying the United States flags throughout the City. She pointed out maintenance of the waterfront flags. Ms. Myers requested City ordinance provisions to maintain the United States flags on City property.

Dale Kuntz, 5 Fox Point, noted that attention needed to be given to the grass growing along Court Street as it gets greener with the Spring rains. Signs along the State Route were also looking dumpy. He advised that other cities have created programs that assist in cleanup efforts.

Seth Freidrich, 3180 Edgewater Drive, addressed the Council regarding his interpretation that adoption of the 2012 International Energy Conservation Code was required by the City. Mr. Wuellner indicated the building code provisions would be reviewed to ascertain if additional energy efficiency, cost reductions, conservation of natural resources language was sufficient. Tim Golden, 2104 Alhambra, spoke supporting Mr. Freidrich's issue.

James Layne, 1411 South 7th Street, voiced concern of a blocked alley from a strung cable. It was Attorney Dancey's opinion that it was not the City's jurisdiction and would not be involved in a property dispute among the adjacent parties.

The Press was given the opportunity to ask questions.

No further business to come before the Council, motion by Council Member Schmidgall, seconded by Council Member Abel. Motion approved vice voce.

- I. Welcome and introductions – 7:35 am; Present: Melinda Figge, Bill Fleming, Roger Goodson, Gregg Ratliff and Becky Saban. Also Present: Pamela Anderson and Greg Nelson. Michael Freilinger submitted his resignation to the Mayor, so we have two seats vacant.
- II. Approval of agenda - On a motion by Saban, second by Figge, the agenda was approved.
- III. Approval of minutes – On a motion by Saban, second by Figge, the minutes of the last meeting were approved.
- IV. Correspondence and feedback – None.
- V. Old Business
 - A. Murals (Pekin High School) – The Pekin Union Mission Board did not have the opportunity to discuss the mural project at the last meeting. They will take it up at their April meeting. Their board president, Burt Dancey, is aware of the project and his concerns have been addressed. We discussed the potential for a mural on the east side of their building that might work in a potential courtyard.
 - B. HRC community awareness activity
 - a. We discussed plans for the breakfast seminar on May 22nd from 7:30am to 9:00am at FCI Pekin's Community Room. Illinois American will sponsor the breakfast. Marvis Meyer from AAIM/Employers Association will speak on "Building Diversity Leaders in Our Community." Fleming will contact Debra Isbell about catering. The Chamber will take reservations and distribute a flyer to chamber members. We want to focus on attendance from Pekin Insurance, Pekin Hospital, the banks, and social service agencies. We also want to send a press release to the media.
 - b. The Stand Against Racism event is Friday, April 26th. There will be a lunch time program on the Courthouse lawn featuring students from District 150 and PCHS. Businesses are encouraged to sign up online to be a part of the Stand.

- c. We discussed possible events we might host on August 28th – the 50th Anniversary of Dr. Martin Luther King’s “I Have A Dream” speech. Ideas included replaying the speech on channel 22, asking local celebrities to read the speech (either at a live event or video-taped and edited together), or a diversity book distribution through the food banks.

C. HRC future vision

- a. Last month’s meeting generated several ideas for future events and direction.
- b. Fleming noted the idea of a cultural fair and said Illinois Central College would be hosting one in the near future. He said he’d get the info out to the committee so they could see if that was something we could do in Pekin.
- c. Figge offered the idea to have discussions/training about how the city is prepared to react to incidents. Have we thought about what our message would be? Who speaks for the city? How we respond? We decided the city staff might be the best place to start those discussions, and we might want to bring a PR consultant in to help us think it through
- d. Fleming suggested an “awards” program, where the City could recognize businesses for their diversity efforts (hiring, training, recruitment, etc.)
- e. Figge suggested we partner with the library on some kind of “community read” and discussion on a book with diversity themes.

Deputy Liquor Commissioner Rick VonRohr called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m.

PLEDGE of ALLEGIANCE was led by Police Chief Greg Nelson

The following members were present for roll call: Liquor Commissioner Laurie Barra, Deputy Liquor Commissioner Rick VonRohr, Police Chief Greg Nelson, Fire Chief Kurt Nelson, Commission Member Dale Vonderheide.

Also present: Attorney Sue Bosich – Corporation Counsel and Sue McMillan, City Clerk

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Motion made by Liquor Commissioner Barra to approve the Agenda, seconded Police Chief Nelson. On roll call vote all present voted Aye. Motion carried.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion made by Commission Member Vonderheide to approve the Special Liquor Commission Minutes of April 3, 2013, seconded by Fire Chief Kurt Nelson. On roll call vote all present voted Aye. Motion carried.

PUBLIC INPUT/COMMENTS/QUESTIONS

Casey's General Store, 1800 N. 8th Street – Store Manager Dianne Walters and Jennifer Passmore
They would like to get a liquor license to sell package liquor (beer only) at their N. 8th Street store. They would have a "beer cave", which is a cooler by itself with a door that you walk in. Doors would be locked during non-liquor sale hours and there would be camera's inside. Ms. Walters stated 33% of their sales is prepared foods. Ms. Walters stated she feels most of her customers come in order a pizza and then drives home, she feels this would be the same as if they sold alcohol – most stop in and are headed home. She sees this as a positive for Pekin and also would bring in more revenue for the City. Ms. Passmore stated there are only a few Casey stores that do not sell alcohol. They have different conditions with each store. Underage 21 employees would work in the kitchen area and not on the selling floor. They would not have "delivery".

Discussion: Deputy Liquor Commissioner Rick VonRohr stated the Liquor Commission has looked at this before and it was voted down. The Liquor Commission will revisit this issue. The Liquor Commission understands the impact this would have. . All hard liquor would have to be behind the counter. There could be limits set, lock on coolers or cover up after hours. Wal-mart stores that can sell alcohol cover up or rope off the area that they sell. There could be issues with gas stations or existing stores wanting a liquor license to sell alcohol. Police Chief Nelson stated Casey's General store made some good points and will take this under advisement Attorney Bosich stated we would have to amend the Liquor Code.

Avanti's Dome – 3401 Griffin Avenue – Dan Steinbach and John Smock

Dan asked when their liquor license for the Avanti's Dome would be ready. Attorney Bosich informed them their liquor license liability insurance needs to reflect the one address and name City of Pekin as Certificate

Holder. Attorney Bosich is drafting the conditions and stated their license would be ready by renewal time, April 30th, 2013.

Discussion on Class C liquor license. Liquor Commission members discussed since the Class C is unique, sort of like the golf courses, the fee should reflect the sale of hard liquor on both premises and the beer garden. Liquor Commission decided for a Class C liquor license for Avanti's Dome will be \$2500.00.

Sue McMillan stated Kroger's Limited called inquiring about having wine tasting at their store. Attorney Bosich stated they would need to get a One Day Liquor License. Liquor Commissioner VonRohr stated long ago in a liquor commission meeting it was decided they would not need one and to follow the State Liquor Control Commission.

Paula to add "Sell Package Liquor" on next Agenda. This past weekend the Speakeasy Art Center had a Springfest Event and bands with a BYOB. Just wondered how they could get by with that on each function they have without getting a liquor license. Would they not need a One Day Liquor License?

Discussion: Not profiting off of it and not selling the alcohol. They've had private parties and it was a BYOB. Attorney Bosich will do some research on this.

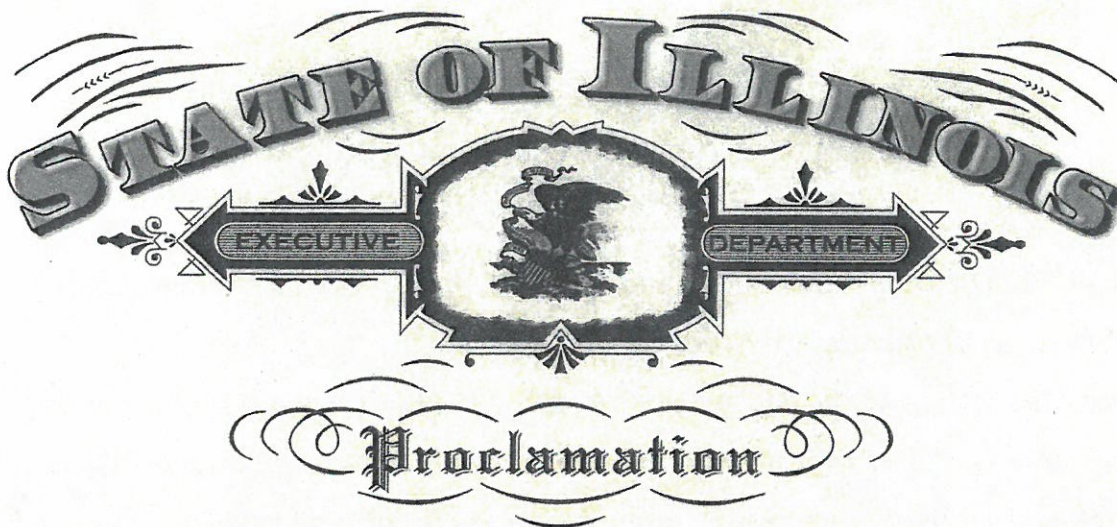

Pekin Public Library Strategic Plan

FY2014-2019

Mission statement

Pekin Public Library serves as the community's information center and gathering place. People have the opportunity to connect, discover, conduct the business of life, and leave enriched and satisfied.

Vision statement

We want Pekin to be a prosperous community that values civility, knowledge, and connectivity. The community should have a safe, neutral place to interact; take advantage of educational, recreational and cultural opportunities; and discover the resources to achieve personal goals.

(Internal Vision Statement - Programmatic)

Our library provides:

- A wide selection of free high-quality programs, materials, and services in response to the changing trends and needs of the community.
- A welcoming environment with a variety of meeting spaces for community members to conduct the business of life.
- Programming and collaboration with educators to increase literacy levels in the community.

(Internal Vision Statement - Administrative)

Board members and staff are the voice for the library, keep their fingers on the pulse of the community, and engage with one another.

The management team collaborates to provide services.

Working together, we secure sufficient resources to support a safe and welcoming facility, and maintain a technological edge.

We attract and develop sufficient staff and support staff members with fair compensation, support, and a positive work environment.

Board members and staff work together with mutual respect.

Strategy: Implement a formal training program to address safety readiness, core competencies, customer service and communication

Background: Based on customer, Board trustees, and employee feedback from recent surveys, a formal training program would address customer service and safety concerns. Also, surveys show that an updated Board orientation process and ongoing continuing education for trustees will improve satisfaction with their experience on the Board.

Key Goals:

1. Develop core competency training program for staff.
2. Develop and implement a year-round safety education program.
3. Increase customer satisfaction.
4. Increase employee satisfaction.
5. Improve Board of Trustees effectiveness and satisfaction through continuous education and advocacy.

Strategy: Renovate facility and develop/update library grounds

Background: The current library building was completed in 1974. The library Board and staff have worked with architects since 1998 to develop plans for renovating the library's dated public spaces and failing infrastructure. In 2004 and again in 2008, the library sought support from the Pekin City Council to move forward with the plans. Ultimately, it was the economic downturn of 2007-2008 that put the project off for several more years.

While the main project has been delayed for nearly a decade, some immediate improvements were needed, and so the library invested in refurnishing and remodeling certain public spaces. Infrastructure repairs - such as HVAC upgrades, a new roof, and brick tuck pointing and caulking - were also undertaken.

The library is at a crossroads for how to continue with the extensive improvements that are still required. Recent surveys of community members and staff note many issues that they would like to see resolved soon: Entrance ramp safety, parking, interior and exterior lighting, additional small meeting spaces, cramped Youth Services department, and a need for teen space.

Bond rates still remain low, and as a project of this importance is a 20-year investment, it makes sense that current and future families contribute to its funding. In the long run, bonds sold in 2014 will save the community thousands of dollars in repayment interest if compared to bonds sold in later years.

Key Goals:

1. Select a new architect for the building project.

2. Secure funding approval from City Council.
3. Seek supplemental funding from grant and private sources.
4. Initiate building project.

Strategy: Raise early literacy levels in the community

Background: The public library plays an important role in the reading achievement of children who lack access to books and other reading materials in their daily lives. Research has shown that the amount of time children spend with books is crucial to reading achievement, and ultimately, to school achievement in general.

The Pekin Public Library offers a wide variety of programming for all ages, and in recent years, the library has seen an explosion in technology training. While we recognize the value of such programs in serving the needs of all citizens and all ages, and while we will continue to offer such programs, we must continue to remain true and focused on promoting early literacy.

As a core strategy for this strategic plan, the library affirms promoting early literacy in Pekin as a major programming focus for the next five years.

Key Goals:

1. Increase early literacy learning opportunities in our library.
2. Increase early literacy learning opportunities in the community.
3. Create fiscal support for expanded in library and off site activities.

Strategy: Develop a marketing plan for traditional, social, and alternative outlets

Background: The library has had a public relations position for the past 15 years; however, no formal marketing plan has ever been created to target the library's services. Now with rise in social media and based on customer feedback, the library should have a targeted marketing plan to change the outdated perception of the library and increase service use and program attendance.

Key Goals:

1. Hire a library marketing consultant or marketing intern to help staff write a comprehensive marketing plan incorporating both new and traditional media.
2. Support marketing efforts by developing budget line for paid advertising.

STATE STATUTES

Sec. 3.1-35-35. Mayor or president pro tem; temporary chairman.

(a) If the mayor or president is temporarily absent because of an incapacity to perform official duties, but the incapacity does not create a vacancy in the office, the corporate authorities shall elect one of their members to act as mayor or president pro tem. The mayor or president pro tem, during this absence or disability, shall perform the duties and possess all the rights and powers of the mayor or president but shall not be entitled to vote both as mayor or president pro tem and as alderman or trustee.

(b) In the absence of the mayor, president, acting mayor or president, or mayor or president pro tem, the corporate authorities may elect one of their members to act as a temporary chairman. The temporary chairman shall have only the powers of a presiding officer and a right to vote only in the capacity as alderman or trustee on any ordinance, resolution, or motion.

- F. Presiding Officer: The Mayor shall preside at all regular and special meetings of the Council; provided, that in the absence of the Mayor, a Mayor Pro Tem shall be selected as provided by statute. (65 ILCS 5/3.1-35-35) and Resolution No. 22-07/08 (Ord. No. 2547-07/08 1-14-08)
