PUBLIC INPUT ON AGENDA ITEMS

John Hadsall 1220 El Camino Drive, addressed the Council regarding the rezoning ordinance on El Camino Drive. He stated that he originally opposite the construction of the units but since the 4 unit buildings were scaled down to 6 duplex units the change would allow the residents to support the project. He voiced concern about the drainage of the complex, the fencing, and the garbage receptacles. He presented photos of his concerns for the record. Mr. Hadsall asked that Council continue to scrutinize all development in the future..

COMMUNICATIONS, PETITIONS, REPORTS

LIBRARY IMPROVEMENTS BOND ISSUE PRESENTATION

Director of the Pekin Public Library, Jeff Brooks, distributed the presentation brochure prepared by the proposed architect, Dewberry. He next introduced Michael Mackey who addressed the Council regarding the addition, renovation, the company's research and observation of the facility, and generally the 21st Century library designs. Mr. Brooks advised the Council on the 2008 project proposal that was not funded. He stated that the board had taken the conceptual plan, identified current ADA compliances, improved access, safety matters, better services for children, and lower maintenance costs. He requested that the City Council consider approving a levy increase for a \$5.6 million bond repayment. The library would be able to contribute an additional \$400,000.00. Each Council Member was given the opportunity to comment and ask questions. Council Member Golden asked if the library had applied for state construction funding. Council Member McCabe expressed concern that the one-way traffic pattern in accessing the Library still needed to be addressed before final design. Council Member Hendricks felt it important to have input from the youth of the community for services and design. Mayor Barra was informed that a \$5.6 million bond sale would increase the library levy 4% resulting in an addition to the tax bill of \$29-\$35 per \$100,000 house. No action was taken by the Council.

NEW BUSINESS

ORDINANCE NO. 1568-A198-13/14

PROVIDING FOR THE REZONING OF CERTAIN PROPERTY

PIN 10-10-11-400-041 & PART OF 10-10-11-400-042 & 10-10-11-400-0043

Motion by Council Member Orrick, seconded by Council Member Abel that Ordinance No.1568-A198-13/14 be adopted. Code Enforcement Officer Ron Sieh presented the ordinance and site plan from the recommendation of the Planning Commission. The ordinance provided for the request of Jeffrey L. Horneker and Cynthia E. Hornecker as purchasers of the Gaylord Trust property portion and 10-10-11-400-041 to rezone 1.33 acre parcel of land adjacent and west of the Gingoteague general store from B-3 (General Business) district to RM-1 (Multiple Family Residential) District. Mr. Sieh addressed the questions and concerns from Council Members regarding a retention pond, the difference in zero lot line duplex and condo. He stated that it was not the intention to have Section 8 Housing units and that totter verses dumpster garbage collection met code requirements. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

Motion by Council Member Orrick, seconded by Council Member Gillespie that the **SITE PLAN FOR PROPERTY ON EL CAMINO DRIVE adjacent to Gingoteague general store** be approved. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

Motion by Council Member McCabe, seconded by Council Member Orrick that the **FEDERAL AVIATION ADMINISTRATION AGREEMENT for Terms and Conditions of Accepting Airport Improvement Program Grants** be approved. City Engineer Michael Guerra asked that Council approve the agreement for the terms and conditions of accepting the Airport Improvement Program grant money. He advised Council that the agreement had been approved October 9, 2012, however the FAA change some language regarding the financial invoicing for FAA grantees to utilize the Delphi eInvoicing System for the Department of Transportation. Mr. Guerra answered Council Member Golden's questions specific to the terms of the contract. He stated that the Airport had a 5 year retainer agreement for engineering projects so there was not competitive bidding on the latest improvement projects. Discussion followed regarding monitoring fuel pricing. Council Member Hendricks advised that he had requested an extensive business plan of the airport department. On roll call vote; Ayes, Golden, Orrick, Gillespie, McCabe, Abel, and Barra; Nay, Hendricks. Motion Carried.

ORDINANCE NO. 1462-A328-13/14

AMENDING TITLE 8 TRAFFIC CODE OF THE CITY OF PEKIN 1995 REGARDING SPEED ZONES

Motion by Council Member Golden, seconded by Council Member Orrick that Ordinance No.1462-A328-13/14 be adopted. Police Chief Greg Nelson presented the recommendation of the Traffic Safety Committee to adjust the speed limits on South Fifth Street between Koch Street and VFW Road (Veterans Drive). He stated the reduced speed to 30 mph, statutory urban speed, would accommodate the growth in the Deerfield area and that the inconsistent speed limit signs for northbound and southbound traffic would be changed. Fifth Street Hanna Drive to VFW would be 45 mph. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS BEFORE THE COUNCIL

City Engineer Michael Guerra advised the public of the 2 month detour at VFW Road and N. 14th Street to remove a box culvert for Lost Creek just west of the VFW Hall.

Chief Greg Nelson thanked the planners and the public for a very successful Nite Out Against Crime sponsored by the police department. Council Member McCabe noted he and his grandson attended the Halloween theme event and praised it as a very good learning experience.

Mayor Barra announced that the City does not set the hours for Trick-or-Treat on Halloween. She also alerted the public to a Veterans Day remembrance on Monday November 11, 2013 on the Court House lawn.

Council Member Hendricks asked what economic development impact to the City has been tracked for the airing of the City segment last July on the FOX television station. He asked that consideration be given to increasing the 40 mph speed limit on Parkway Drive to Route 98 and was told that the segment of road was under County jurisdiction.

Council Member Gillespie expressed appreciation for the Police Department photo, something not done since the 1970's.

Council Member Golden referred to a newspaper "fix it" article that reported there was nothing in the Property Maintenance Code with enough teeth to go after the owners of the property in regards to the terrible condition of the driveway of Sara Lane. He read the provisions found in the Code that the City adopted the 2006 Property Maintenance Code and quoted section 302.3. He question why the City could not enforce owners to maintain the private drive free of hazardous conditions and in proper state of repair. Code Enforcement Officer Ron Sieh responded that he would check on Council Member Golden's inquiry.

Council Member Golden questioned the City Manager as to when the City would take ownership of the West Campus, if the demolition contractor had a permit, and if the City would seek an appraisal for the sale. He voiced concerns of City liability after seeing the sale of components of the property posted on Craig's List. Attorney Burt Dancey and the City Manager addressed any concerns that Council Member Golden had regarding the City's role as conduit for the transfer of the West Campus property from owner Merl Huff to the Chicago Title Land Trust Co. Attorney Dancey stated that the ownership by the City would take 10 seconds or time it takes to record both the deed and the donation agreement. It was stated that a permit would be pulled and that the appraisal was the current owner responsibility.

Phillis Myers, 2500 Court Street, addressed the Council regarding her passion that the proper protocol and attention that was needed in displaying the United States flag at the riverfront.

John Hadsall, 1220 El Camino Drive expressed appreciation for Council's consideration of the zoning change and the development plans for new duplexes on El Camino Drive.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Motion by Council Member Abel, seconded by Council Member McCabe, that the Council move to Executive Session at 7:05 p.m. to discuss 65 ILCS 120/2 (c) (5) Acquisition of Property. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

No further business to come before the Council, motion by Council Member Abel, seconded by Council Member Hendricks that Council adjourn. Motion carried voice vote. Mayor Barra adjourned the meeting.

Motion by Council Member Abel, seconded by Council Member Gillespie, that the **minutes of the Regular City Council Meeting of October 28, 2013 be approved as written**. Council Member Golden asked that corrections be made to the minutes in regards to his comments on enforcing property maintenance code for Sara Lane and West Campus liability. Because there was not a clear understanding by Council of the changes needed from the floor, the Clerk suggested the minutes be denied and presented to Council for approval when request was accurate. On roll call vote, Nays, Golden, Orrick, Gillespie, McCabe, Abel, Hendricks; Aye, Barra. Motion failed.

PUBLIC INPUT ON AGENDA ITEMS

Sue Crowel, 332 Park Avenue, speaking as Library Board Member, asked for Council support for the expansion and renovation plan for the Library.

CONSENT AGENDA

Motion by Council Member Abel, seconded by Council Member Gillespie, that the **CONSENT AGENDA be approved as presented**. The following was presented for consideration of the Consent Agenda items by Omnibus Vote.

7.1 Receive and File Monthly Reports: Building, Inspections, & Zoning Reports September 2013; and Human Rights Committee Minutes September 25, 2013.

7.2 Receive and File Financial Statements April 30, 2013 prepared by Willock Warning & Co., P.C.; Tazewell/Pekin Consolidated Communication Center Fund; Sewerage Fund; and Tax Increment Financing – Central Business District Fund

Council Member Orrick asked that 7.2 be placed for discussion under New Business. On roll call vote all present voted Aye.

NEW BUSINESS

Motion by Council Member Orrick, seconded by Council Member Abel that the Council **support the EXPANSION AND RENOVATION PLAN FOR THE LIBRARY contingent upon final plans and costs estimates being available for a not to exceed figure of \$6 million**. The Council was informed of the Board of Trustees' consensus that should the City Council vote to support the renovation project, the library would contract with Dewberry to update the Schematic Design and costs estimates required for the final bond ordinance vote. Council Members directed questions to Library Director Jeff Brooks concerning adequacy of present services, placement of the bond issue as separate item on tax bills, and use of bond money for services or resources. Council Member Golden asked that the public's willingness to support funding the renovation costs be gauged by placing the question on the voting ballot similar to how Peoria proceeded. Motion made by Council Member Golden that the library bond issue be placed on the ballot as a

non-binding referendum. It was the opinion of Attorney Dancey that a vote from Council on the request would require notice as a new business item on a future agenda to be valid. Council Member Golden made some suggestions that could be made without the expansion and renovations. Each Council Member was given the opportunity to speak. Referring to Dewberry's previous meeting presentation, Council Member McCabe's voiced concern that the architect would possibly design a building that did not fit Pekin. There was general consensus in support of the project. Council Member Golden noted he was not opposed but felt it was important for public input first. On roll call vote, Ayes, Orrick, Gillespie, McCabe, Abel, Hendricks, Barra; Nay, Golden. Motion Carried.

ORDINANCE NO. 2691-13/14
AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF THE IMLRMA
MINIMUM/MAXIMUM CONTRIBUTION AGREEMENT

Motion by Council Member Hendricks, seconded by Council Member Orrick that Ordinance No.2691-13/14 be adopted. Assistant Finance Director Angie Evans recommended the authorization for Illinois Municipal League Risk Management Association agreement of premiums for work comp, liability, and property insurance based on claim history of a pool of municipalities rather than individual claims. She told Council the City chose the option to pay a lower premium as long as costs stay below the minimum amount. In the 11 year history the City had gone over only twice. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

Motion by Council Member Gillespie, seconded by Council Member Abel that the Illinois Department of Transportation **LOCAL AGENCY AGREEMENT FOR FEDERAL PARTICIPATION** in the amount of \$600,000 for the **SHERIDAN ROAD BRIDGE PROJECT** be approved. City Engineer Michael Guerra advised the Council that per the agreement the City would receive 80% finding for constructing the bridge over Lick Creek. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

RESOLUTION NO. 80-13/14
IDOT RESOLUTION FOR MAINTENANCE OF STREETS AND HIGHWAYS FOR
MUNICIPALITY – MOTOR FUEL TAX FUND

Motion by Council Member Golden, seconded by Council Member Orrick that Resolution No.80-13/14 be adopted. Council heard the resolution appropriates Motor Fuel Tax in the amount of \$600,000.00 for Midwest Design Agreement Phase II Engineering Services for Veterans Drive from Sheridan Road to Fisher Road. The City Engineer originally intended to use Capitol Funds to cover the cost of the agreement adopted at the October 15, 2013 meeting. Council questioned if Creve Coeur would be participating with funding or paying for Fischer Road passed the 474 interchange. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

RESOLUTION NO. 81-13/14
IN SUPPORT OF PPUATS PROJECT SOUTH FIFTH STREET

Motion by Council Member McCabe, seconded by Council Member Hendricks that Resolution No.81-13/14 be adopted. The resolution is the City's written support for the widening project and obtaining funding for Peoria/Pekin Urbanized Area Transportation Study funding year 2018-2017. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

Motion by Council Member Hendricks, seconded by Council Member Orrick that **FINANCIAL STATEMENTS APRIL 30, 2013 PREPARED BY WILLOCK WARNING & CO., P.C.: TAZWELL/PEKIN CONSOLIDATED COMMUNICATION CENTER FUND; SEWERAGE FUND; AND TAX INCREMENT FINANCING – CENTRAL BUSINESS DISTRICT FUND BE APPROVED.** Council Member Orrick asked that the Receive and File Consent Item be moved to New Business to discuss investment earnings figure specifically, in the TIF Audit. He questioned a large 486,217 figure listed as investment earnings current year. Staff would confirm with Jim Warning that the numbers were transposed with real state tax increments on page 7 Schedule A of the audit.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS BEFORE THE COUNCIL

Council Member McCabe praised the Pekin Community High School Army JROTC Honor Guard performance of the Prisoner of War/Missing in Action ceremony as part of the Veterans Day observance. Mayor Barra echoed the recognition of the participants in the ceremony.

Council Member Abel remarked that it was nice to see all the house and business improvement projects taking

place throughout the City.

Charles Curto, 15875 Red Shale Hill, asked Council to reevaluate the Wastewater Billing Program. He stated that a landlord cannot legally collect wastewater from his tenants when the bill is in his name.

Motion by Council Member McCabe seconded by Council Member Abel, that the Council move to Executive Session at 6:30 p.m. to discuss 65 ILCS 120/2 (c) (6) Disposal of Municipally Owned Property. On roll call vote, all present voted Aye.

No further business to come before the Council, motion in open session by Council Member McCabe, seconded by Council Member Abel that Council adjourn. Motion carried voice vote. Mayor Barra adjourned the meeting.

Old Business:

1. *Crosswalk on 14th St. at Koch St.*

This item had been on last month's agenda. Joe requested that Bob put traffic counters in that location. After further discussion of this location, Joe made a motion to take down the school crossing sign and repaint the crosswalk in the spring and add ladder stripes to make it more visible. Kurt seconded the motion. All in favor. The citizen who made the request will be notified.

New Business:

1. *Flashing Stop Sign on Sheridan Rd. at Veterans Dr.*

At this meeting date, this request had already been taken care of. Greg will check the code regarding the removal of the stop sign at Sheridan Rd. and California Rd. that was discussed at last month's meeting. ** After the meeting it was confirmed that this stop sign is not in the city code. The sign can be taken down without council action.

2. *3-Way Stop @ Arrow St. and Stoneybrook St.*

The traffic conditions in this location do not warrant a 3-way stop. Will made a motion to leave the area as is. Joe seconded the motion. All in favor. Enforcement will be stepped up in this area and the radar trailer will be put there to raise awareness of the speed that vehicles are traveling there. The citizen who made the request will be notified.

3. *2-Way Traffic, S. 4th St. from Broadway Rd. to Washington St.*

Jeff Brooks, Library Director of Pekin Public Library was in attendance regarding this agenda item. He distributed copies of the preliminary site plan for the library remodel that shows where the main parking lot and entrance would be after the remodel is complete. Greg explained the history of the streets being one way. After discussion, Will made a motion to make a recommendation to City Council to change the 300 block of S. 4th St. and the 300 block of S. Capitol St. from one way to 2-way traffic from Broadway Rd. to Washington St. Ron seconded the motion. All in favor. All residents in the 300 block of S. 4th St. and the 300 block of S. Capitol St. will be notified by letter that this will be an agenda item for the City Council meeting of November 25, 2013.

4. *Parking Restriction on Hillyer St. at S. 6th St.*

Charlotte McGovern, 502 S. 6th Street, 267-2772 was in attendance at this meeting as she had made this request. She lives at the corner of Hillyer St. and S. 6th St. She is concerned about the congestion in this location. She stated that vehicles park on

Hillyer St. near the intersection with S. 6th St. on both sides and stay there all day. She said the parking situation started in the summer and after school started, with the extra traffic there, it is worse. Joe explained the history of why the signs were taken down in 2010. Kurt made a motion to table this request until there are results regarding the narrow street issue. This request could come back as a side issue if not resolved by the narrow street topic. Joe seconded the motion. All in favor. The committee will keep her updated on the progress of the narrow street topic and will work to resolve it in one way or the other. Greg explained the process involved in making this type of change.

5. *Handicapped Parking Space on Koch St. @ 1522 Mechanic St.*

After review of the request, Will made a motion to leave the area as is. Ron seconded the motion. All in favor. The citizen who made the request will be notified of the decision.

Around the Table

Following up on the item from last month regarding the Allentown Rd. bus stop, there will be a flashing yellow solar light with hood installed over the dangerous curve sign instead of a school bus stop sign.

Greg had been approached about the intersection of N. 4th St. and Matilda St. during the times of day when traffic is present for school drop off and pick up. The speed spy will be put in that location to monitor traffic and it will also be addressed through enforcement.

Mike and Jim are working on a proposal regarding narrow streets for the City Council to review.

Ron asked for input about adding a 3-way stop at 14th St. and Koch St. Because of the offset, there is no easy solution for a traffic control device in that location.

Mike will look into options for a barrier at the end of Veteran's Dr. at Sheridan Rd.

Mike reported that VFW Rd. is closed for approximately 2 months.

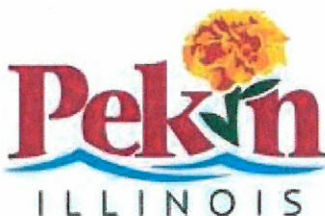
Will stated that the speed sign going east on Mall Rd. is very faded. He asked if it could be replaced.

PLEDGE of ALLEGIANCE led by Fire Chief Nelson

ROLL CALL

The following members were present for roll call: Liquor Commissioner Laurie Barra, Deputy Liquor Commissioner Rick VonRohr, Police Chief Greg Nelson, Fire Chief Kurt Nelson, Commission Member Dale Vonderheide, and Commission Member Buster Hanley.

Also present: Attorney Sue Bosich – Corporation Counsel

Public present: Nick Filarski, Attorney Bridgett Lobacz, David Mahoney, Dianne Walters, Aaron Rodgers, and Dustin Maquet

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Motion made by Commission Member Vonderheide to approve the Agenda for October 24, 2013, seconded by Commission Member Hanley. On roll call vote all present voted Aye. Motion carried.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion made by Commission Member Hanley to approve the Liquor Commission Minutes of September 26, 2013, seconded by Police Chief Nelson. On roll call vote all present voted Aye. Motion carried.

PUBLIC INPUT/COMMENTS/QUESTIONS

Dianne Walters with Casey's General Store wanted it on record that Casey's is still very much interested in obtaining a liquor license for their Pekin store. She thought she would have received a phone call if it was going to be on the Agenda. Not showing up to past meetings does not mean Casey's is not interested.

OLD BUSINESS

Sub-Committee Report Recommendation to sell alcohol (beer and wine) in selected gas stations/convenience stores

VonRohr made a motion to open up for discussion, seconded by Commission Member Vonderheide. On roll call vote all present voted Aye. Motion carried.

Discussion: Liquor Commissioner Barra has not had a chance to talk with all City Council Members, would like to table this discussion until the November meeting. If the City Council shows no interest in changing our current Liquor Code then will not bring the recommendation to Council.

Commission Member Vonderheide made a motion to table the discussion of the Sub-Committee Report for Recommendation until the November Liquor Commission meeting, seconded by Commission Member Hanley. On roll call vote all present voted Aye. Motion carried.

Before the end of the meeting we will have to pick a day in November, since our next meeting falls on Thanksgiving. November 21st, 2013 at 4:00pm. VonRohr will not be in attendance.

Discussion: Quick Pic, 422 Derby Street – David Mahoney and his Attorney Bridgett Lobacz present. Attorney Lobacz stated we left off from the last Liquor Commission meeting that we didn't know if State Law would exclude us on the basis of having more than one license on the premises. She found a section in the State Law; Section 235 ILCS 5/7/14 and it says only one location so described in each location; I'll read the section to you; License issued by only to the premise described in that location as issued thereon and only one location shall be described in each license. Attorney Lobacz feels that it says that we can have one location per license, but it never says that you cannot have more than one license per location. By the plain language in the statute that we are not excluded from having a license; two licenses in the same building and there's still conversation about the definition of the premises which is defined in the Liquor Code. She feels the way the Code is written that her client's store fit into both the City and the State liquor code. Attorney Lobacz states Mr. Mahoney can and will separate his package liquor store and convenience store for a third business of a bar.

Attorney Bosich has a call into the State Liquor Control Commission. Bosich states the City of Pekin's Liquor Code does not allow combined liquor licenses and it would be a violation of our Code.

Police Chief Nelson states this would not fit into the City of Pekin's positive image and is not in favor of this. Liquor Commissioner Barra does not see three businesses in that building and doesn't see how it can be separated. Deputy Liquor Commissioner VonRohr has spoken with the Gaming Board representative and stated it's happening in other areas of the state where they are issuing gaming licenses for area's calling them "Little Casino's".

Motion made to table this discussion until the November 21st, 2013 Liquor Commission meeting.

NEW BUSINESS

New Application: Dustin Maquet – 221 Court Street

Discussion: On the application the box was not marked on what type of liquor license Dustin Maquet is seeking. He stated it would be a Class A. This business will be a restaurant/bar. He plans on opening sometime in January.

Motion made by Fire Chief Nelson to approve the liquor license for Maquet, Inc. contingent upon Inspections, Fire and Police walk-thru's. Mr. Maquet to call these departments when he's ready for a final walk-thru.

Deputy Liquor Commissioner VonRohr tables the discussion on "outside eating" to another meeting so he can do some more research.

Discussion: The High Note – Dyan Davis – 431 ½ Court Street

The High Note is behind on their 2% City Food and Beverage Tax, actually has never paid it since they've open their business. Attorney Bosich has the complaint ready to file and court next month on this issue. VonRohr stated he was ready to pull their liquor license because of not having their alarm system operational. They went and paid up until February 2014. Thursday, December 12th, 2013 they are cited and notified to appear before the Illinois Liquor Control Commission for failure to pay State Sales/Use Tax and Illinois withholding Income tax. If they pay before the court date, this Hearing is dismissed. VonRohr would like some direction on pulling their liquor license if they are not in compliance with the security alarm system. Attorney Bosich stated she will draft a complaint and they would need to be served.

2% Food and Beverage Tax

Melanie, Wastewater Supervisor emailed Liquor Commission late returns on 10/24/13.

Discussion: Sue Bosich stated she has complaint's ready to be filed in court for the Ordinance Violation for the 2% Food and Beverage tax on a non-alcohol business.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

Fire Chief Nelson made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Police Chief Nelson, all in favor, motion carried.

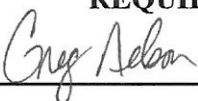

AGENDA ITEM:	Two-way Traffic, 300 Blocks of S. 4 th Street S. Capitol Streets
AGENDA DATE REQUESTED:	November 25, 2013
ACTION REQUESTED:	Change the 300 blocks of S. 4th and S. Capitol Streets (between Broadway and Washington Streets) to allow two-way traffic. The existing parking restrictions are sufficient and no change is requested for parking. This action is at the request of the Traffic Safety Committee.
BACKGROUND:	The Pekin Public Library has had traffic safety problems with the one-way traffic arrangement on S. 4th Street for quite some time. With the possibility of a renovation that moves the entrance and primary parking area to the south side of the building, two-way traffic is even more desirable. Since 4th and Capitol Streets represent a one-way couple, it is recommended that the same block of S. Capitol be addressed also.
FINANCIAL IMPACT:	Little to none.
NEIGHBORHOOD CONCERNS:	There are few residences on S. 4 th Street that would be affected.
IMPACT IF APPROVED:	Two way traffic yields lower speeds and easier business access.
IMPACT IF DENIED:	The current situation would remain the same.
ALTERNATIVES:	S. 4th Street could be changed without changing S. Capitol Street. Alternatively, S.4th could be made two-way from Broadway to Derby Streets.

8-3-8: DRIVING ON RIGHT SIDE OF ROADWAY; EXCEPTIONS:

A. Upon all roadways of sufficient width, a vehicle shall be driven upon the right half of the roadway, except as follows:

1. When overtaking and passing a vehicle proceeding in the same direction under the rules governing such movement.

2. When an obstruction exists making it necessary to drive to the left of the center of the roadway; provided, any person so doing shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles traveling in the proper direction upon the unobstructed portion of the roadway within such distance as to constitute an immediate hazard.

3. One-Way Streets. Vehicles traveling on the portions indicated of the first named streets in each paragraph of this Section shall travel in one direction only. 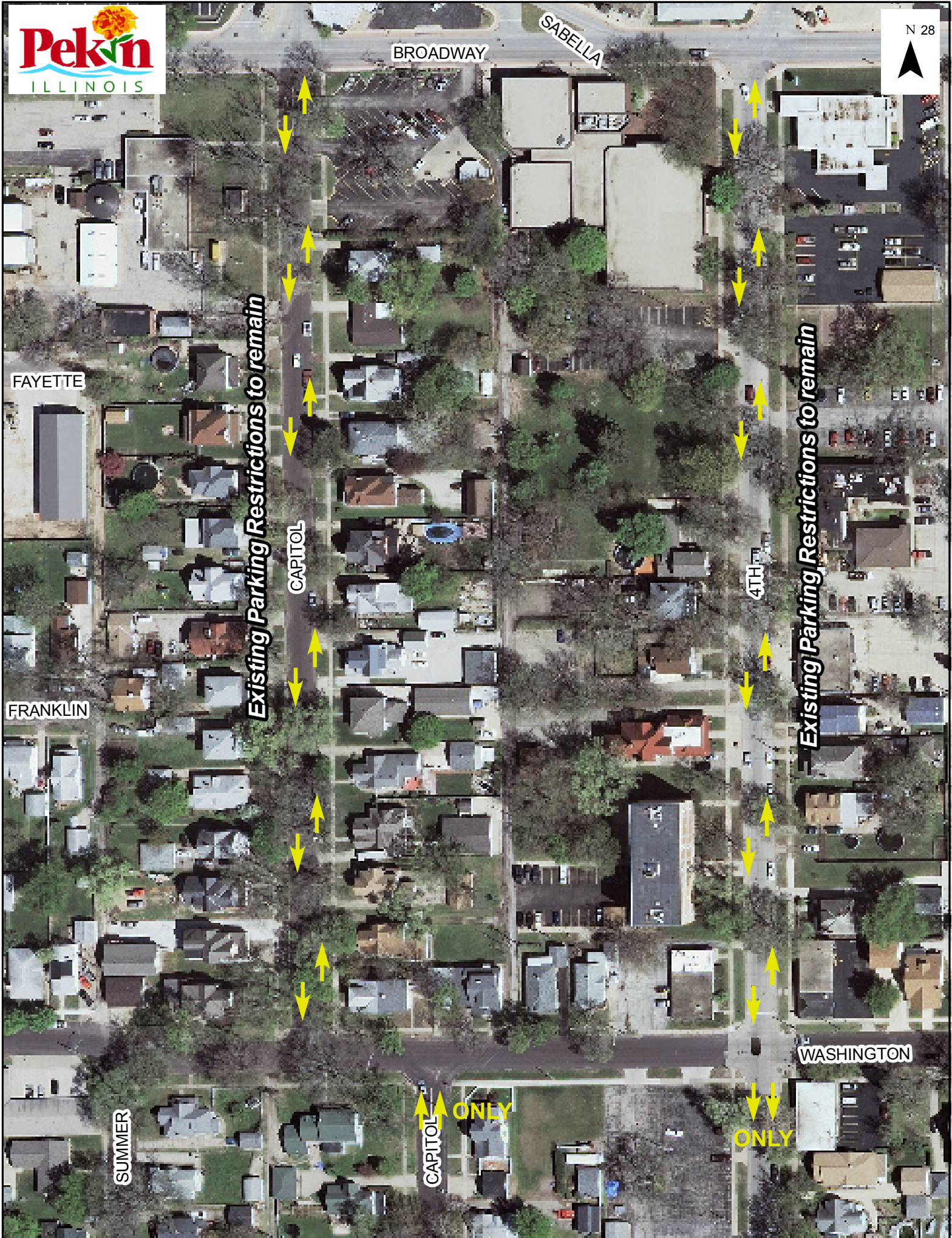

AGENDA DATE REQUESTED: November 25, 2013

ACTION REQUESTED: Approve the Intergovernmental Agreement with Tazewell County Animal Control Services for the coming year (2014) in the amount of \$45,046.

DESCRIPTION: Tazewell County Animal Control Services has been providing this service to the City of Pekin for many years. This is a service that they have the facilities and manpower to provide. They respond to calls for stray domestic animals, properly house and feed them until they are either retrieved by their owners or dealt with in some other manner. The cost for this service is \$45,046 or \$3,753.83 per month which is the same cost as the previous few years.

I recommend that this agreement be approved and that the Tazewell County Animal Control Service continuing handling the picking up and handling of stray animals for the City of Pekin.

FINANCIAL IMPACT: \$45,046 per year (\$3,753.83 per month)

NEIGHBORHOOD CONCERNS: Provides residents with a service to call for stray or lost animals.

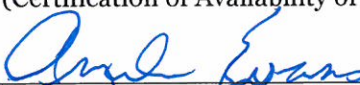

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT
FOR
ANIMAL & RABIES CONTROL SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT, entered into this ____1st____ day of, JANUARY 2014 ____, by and between the County of Tazewell, Illinois, a body politic and corporate (hereinafter referred to as "County") and CITY OF PEKIN_____, a unit of local government of the State of Illinois (hereinafter referred to as "Municipality"), this Agreement being entered into pursuant to Article 7, Section 10 of the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970.

In consideration of the payment by Municipality to the County of the sum of \$ 45,046.00, County agrees to provide the following Animal and Rabies Control services through the Tazewell County Animal & Rabies Control Department, its administrator, director, deputies, and agents as follows.

1. The County shall respond to calls and attempt to pick up animals running at large within the corporate limits of the Municipality between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. seven (7) days a week, including the weekends, but excepting regularly scheduled County Holidays.
2. The County shall attempt to pick up animals running at large on an emergency basis only between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. the next morning on the basis of seven (7) days a week, including weekends. With respect to regularly scheduled County Holidays, the County shall attempt to pick up animals running at large both day and night on an **emergency basis only**. For the purpose of this Contract, an emergency shall be deemed to exist only in those instances where the call involves a bite case or dangerous animal. Emergency calls shall be placed by the City or Village authorities or a citizen of the Municipality to either the Sheriff's Department (346-4141) or the Tazewell County Animal & Rabies Control facility (477-2270 or 925-3370). Responses to night calls and emergency calls shall be made by the Tazewell County Animal Control Warden who is then on duty.
3. The County of Tazewell shall accept and make reasonable response to complaints of citizens concerning animals running at large within the corporate limits of the Municipality.
4. The County shall make regular and irregular patrols thru the corporate limits of the Municipality one day a week at regular and irregular hours. The Warden making the patrol will attempt to notify an authority within the Municipality prior to making such a patrol.
5. The County shall take custody and impound animals apprehended within the corporate limits of the Municipality at the Tazewell County Animal & Rabies facility.
6. The County of Tazewell shall require proof of payment of Municipal reclamation fees to the Municipality by owners of animals sought to be redeemed before releasing said animal from custody.
7. The County of Tazewell shall provide humane treatment of animals removed from the corporate limits of the Municipality during the period of impounding.
8. The County of Tazewell shall make reasonable efforts to locate the owner or owners of any impounded animal providing that said animal is wearing a collar or rabies tag

capable of identifying ownership. Upon identifying the owner or any such animal, an attempt will be made for immediate notification to said owner. A letter shall be mailed to the last known address of the owner notifying him of the impoundment of his animal. Said notification will give notice to the owner that the animal shall be destroyed after the passage of seven (7) days if not reclaimed in accordance with law by the owner. An affidavit or testimony of the Administrator, or his authorized agent, who mails such notice shall be prima facie evidence of the receipt of said notice by the owner of such animal.

9. It is mutually understood and agreed that any animal apprehended from within the corporate limits of the Municipality and impounded at the Tazewell County Animal and Rabies Control Shelter, with respect to whom the owner is unknown but which unknown owner has failed to claim the animal within four (4) working days, shall be humanely dispatched or placed for adoption at the discretion of the Director of the Tazewell County Animal & Rabies Control Department pursuant to the provisions of the Animal Control Act of the State of Illinois.
10. It is further understood and agreed that the consideration payable by the Municipality to the County may at the option of the Municipality be paid in equal monthly installments.
11. This Agreement shall become effective on the 1 day of JANURY 2014, and shall be in full force and effect for a period of one (1) year.
12. This contract shall be governed by the interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois. All relevant provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois applicable hereto and required to be reflected or set forth herein are incorporated by reference.
13. No waiver of any breach of this contract or any provision hereof shall constitute a waiver of any other or further breach of this contract or any provision thereof.
14. This contract is severable, and the invalidity, or unenforceability of any provision of this contract, or a part thereof, should not render the remainder of the contract invalid or unenforceable.
15. This contract may not be assigned by either party without the written consent of the other party.
16. This contract shall be binding upon the parties hereto and upon the successors in interest, assigns, representatives and heirs of such parties.
17. This contract shall not be amended unless in writing expressly stating that it constitutes an amendment to this contract, signed by the parties hereto.
18. The parties hereto agree that the foregoing constitutes all the agreement between the parties and in witness thereof the parties have affixed their respective signatures on the date above first noted.

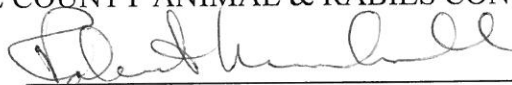

ACTION REQUESTED: To award the contract to Illinois Civil Contractors, Inc for the 2013 Sidewalk Improvement Project in the amount of \$212,779.40

DESCRIPTION: This is to award the bid to Illinois Civil Contractors Inc (ICCI) in the amount of \$212,779.40 for the 2013 Sidewalk Improvements Project. This project is intended to increase the accessibility for pedestrians in the southern portion of town. The project includes sidewalks to be constructed along one side of Koch Street from 5th to the railroad tracks, and along one side of Southmoor and Capitol Streets between Derby and Koch Street. This will increase the amount of sidewalks to an area that has a limited access and improve the safety of pedestrians walking to the newly constructed Sports Complex.

There was a large spread between the bids due to the timing of the project. After reviewing ICCI bid, it is a valid bid and was within 1% of the estimate. I would recommend that this project be awarded to ICCI so that CDBG funding can be utilized to improve the sidewalk infrastructure this year.

FINANCIAL IMPACT: \$212,779.40 of CBDG funding

NEIGHBORHOOD CONCERNS: There will be minor disruption to the certain residences while the contractor performs the necessary work to construct the sidewalks.

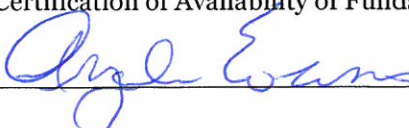
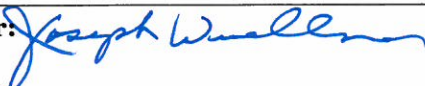
